





Barbara House elected first female chair of WPA Board

"I am deeply honored," Mrs. House said, "and I am very lucky to have the opportunity and privilege of working with people I love."

Mrs. House brings to her new position a wealth of experience in serving the Association and the fraternal benefit system on the local, state and national levels. She has been a member of the WPA Board for 17 years and has served as vice chair of the board since October 2007. She also has represented WPA at the Michigan Fraternal Congress (MFC), serving on numerous MFC committees.

All the while, she has continued to be a leader at Branch 18. Under her leadership as branch president, the branch continues to be one of the Association's largest and most active branches, conducting numerous fraternal, social and charitable events



every year and supporting many Hungarian organizations in Detroit and the surrounding area.

Mrs. House began her professional career in cosmetology, working as an in-

structor at the Michigan State College of Beauty. She owned and operated her own business, Barbara's Hair Gallery in Southgate, Mich., for nine years before assuming a position as a promotional representative for J.R. Marketing.

I have been traveling to Hungary since 1989, when the Russian troops finally made their official exit from Hungary. That was a joyful time for everyone; but since then, there have been many changes.

One of the highlights for me on the 2010 WPA trip to Hungary and Croatia was the festival in the town of Tard. This is a unique village located a short distance from the historic city of Eger. As we pulled onto the narrow street leading to the entrance of the festival, several women in Matyó attire came out to officially greet us and proceeded to escort us onto the fairgrounds.

This particular celebration was a "Rooster Stew Competition." Each group of participants had a small cooking area, complete with a colorful table set so you could sit down and taste the stew. After tasting the selections, you could vote for your favorite stew or cook. There were huge trophies at the tables of previous winners. This indeed was a very serious competition!

As the cooking continued, we visited a seemingly endless number of booths selling crafts, jewelry, noodles, jelly, honey and many other items. But I think the most unusual booth--and probably the most popular--was one displaying rings of kolbász, various cuts of meat, tepertő, bacon and numerous other selections. This was truly a Hungarian butcher shop right in the open-air market. I tried to get close to the booth, but my husband cautioned me that I could not purchase anything of that nature to take home. As I sadly turned away, I resigned myself to buying a few bags of homemade noodles and fantasized about how good they would taste in my own csirke leves.

The homemade pastries were another tantalizing attraction which I found hard to resist. I purchased a huge lángos (fried dough). It was beyond anything I had ever experienced in my life. Seriously, it was incredible!

Life Insurance Tips & Information for Young Adults

AS A YOUNG ADULT, you may be without parental support for the first time. You may be away from home as a student or an employee. It is important to understand the long-term and financial implications left by the insurance decisions you make today.

There are differing opinions about the importance of purchasing life insurance as a young single since you are unlikely to support individuals whose livelihood is dependent upon your income. While buying a policy early in your life will provide you with better deals and potentially guarantee your insurability, some experts doubt that individuals need life insurance at a young age when they typically don't have dependents.

As a young single, you should consider your options and make a choice based on your finances, health and other circumstances. It always makes sense to start thinking about life insurance early-on so that you can make the most educated decision.

When choosing a life insurance product, permanent and term policies are the two major options. If you are a young professional, earning a good salary, able to afford higher premiums and looking for a savings component, you might want to invest in permanent insurance, such as a whole life policy, which builds cash value and also pays a death benefit.

On the other hand, a term life policy, which offers death benefit protection for a specified time period, is a less expensive option for young people who are still working out their finances and just want to leave something for their loved ones in the event of their death. Term life is typically less expensive in your younger years than permanent life insurance, which covers you for your entire life and typically has level

If you can't afford whole life insurance right now, but think you may want it in the future, you may want to consider term life insurance with a conversion option that will let you change to a whole life policy for a fee when you are ready.

If you are in the military, consider Serviceman's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) - a program of low-cost group term life insurance automatically available to all military members. This policy is automatically



activated unless the service member opts out.

If you have decided to purchase additional life insurance outside of the SGLI, review the list of exclusions to the policies, and make sure that the benefits will be payable even if the death is a result of war, the action of a military force or traveling on a non-commercial aircraft.

Individuals who sell life insurance at military installations are required to obtain authorization from the Department of Defense, so ask to see the agent's permit or license.

The cost of life insurance is affected by multiple factors that you should understand. However, some are not easily in your control, such as pre-existing or chronic health problems like diabetes, heart disease or cancer.

But others are more behavioral in nature and, therefore, within your power, such as...

- * Poor health habits, such as smoking and excessive
- * Your driving record, in terms of accidents, Driving While Intoxicated citations, tickets and claims. The better your driving record, the better the rates you'll receive for your life insurance.

* Engaging in dangerous hobbies, such as skydiving or rock climbing.

The insurance business is all about assessing risk. If you participate in high-risk activities or exhibit highrisk behaviors, insurers will treat you as a high-risk customer. They may charge you higher premiums or deny you coverage.

FROM THE PERSPECTIVE of my family, 2010 was not much fun. We hope the year 2011 will bring all of us better health, fortune and stability.

For this month's column, I've decided to bring to you a bit of humor along with a smattering of thought provoking self-inventory.

Hungary will host and pay for all of the European Union meetings during the first half of the year 2011. The biggest concern about this undertaking is the huge expense involved in hosting these gala activities. With Hungary on such poor financial footing, there is concern there will not be enough money to pay for everything.

Another concern is that the other European Union members are requesting that a steady stream of Magyar wine, in particular Tokaji, be on hand for liberal and unabated consumption. The wine purveyors of Hungary want cash for their precious bort. The Hungarian government wants to compensate them with credit and tax exemptions.

Did you know singer-songwriter Paul Simon is of Magyar ancestry?

He was born on Oct. 13, 1941, in the Hungarian section of Newark, N.J. Both of his parents were born in Hungary. His mother was an elementary school teacher, and his father was a bass player, college professor and bandleader. Before emigrating to the U.S., the elder Simon was a pioneer in radio broadcasting at Radio Budapest.

At age 11, Paul teamed up with school chum Art Garfunkel to form their first group, Tom and Jerry. In 1964, the duo signed a recording contract with Columbia Records. During the next six years, as "Simon and Garfunkel," the team produced many hits, including "Sounds of Silence," "Mrs. Robinson," and "Bridge Over Troubled Water." They were one of the first performing groups to use their real ethnic names for their group name. Most of their songs were written and composed by Simon. The duo broke up amicably in 1970 but has reunited for special events.

Simon continues to compose and perform and has given much of his time and efforts into charitable endeavors. In 2006, Time magazine named him of the "100 People Who Shaped the World."

Simon has received 12 Grammy Awards and was enshrined into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame twice. In 1990, he was inducted with Garfunkel, and in 2001, as a solo performer.

It has been brought to my attention that three recipes in our current cookbook need clarification:

- Page 144, Kossuth Moon Cake: the recipe calls for eight ounces of sweet butter, not one-third pound.

- Page 157, Almond Sandies: the second item in the list of ingredients should be "1 cup sugar," not "one cup flour."

- Page 186, Shortbread Cookies: "1 cup cornstarch" in this recipe is correct.

Monthly Trivia: What Hungarian food brings good luck for the whole year when eaten on New Year's Day? The answer waits on the top of your stove (and at the end of the recipe section)! Into the kitchen, we go....

I am often asked: "What is the difference between a cook and a chef?" Let me explain the difference. A "cook" is any person who cooks food. This can be a man, woman or child who prepares food by means of a heat source. A "chef" is a cook but with more responsibilities and knowledge. There can be many cooks but only one person in charge of creating the menu, buying food, organizing the kitchen and assigning jobs: those are the duties of a chef. Chefs put in more time to study recipes, cuisines and techniques.

Cooks are one-dimensional; chefs multitask to achieve culinary excellence throughout the kitchen.

Cooks need recipes in order to practice their trade; chefs create, using talent, technique and skill.

Many times, a chef will over achieve by stepping out of his or her comfort zone and take chances with food; most cooks stay within the confines of their kitchen feeling safe, not wanting to explore the world of culinary delights.

Who is right and who is wrong depends upon your point of view. When I write this column every month, my first thought is: "For whom am I writing this?" The goal is to produce a food column for all to enjoy. The recipes should vary in degree of difficulty, as should the recipes chosen. The challenge to become a better cook is always available. Are you up to the task? This month the recipes are all for soup.

Zöld Bableves

2 lbs. cut string beans

I tablespoon white vinegar

2 tablespoons sour cream

I tablespoon salt

2 quarts cold water

2 tablespoons lard

2 tablespoons flour

I small onion, thinly sliced

½ teaspoon paprika

½ teaspoon fresh chopped parsley

Cook the string beans in the cold water with salt until they are tender. Take the shortening, flour and onions and cook together until well browned. Add ½ cup of cold water and the paprika. Add this to the beans, then stir in the vinegar. When ready to serve, stir in the sour cream. Serve hot to your guests.

Roman Bean Soup

1/2 lb. dried Roman beans

2 quarts cold water

2 tablespoons shortening

2 tablespoons flour

I medium white onion, diced

½ teaspoon paprika

½ cup sour cream



I tablespoon white vinegar 1/2 lb. smoked kolbász Or

I lb. smoked ham hocks

Wash the beans and drain well. Put meat into a large kettle with two quarts of cold water, then add the drained beans. Add seasoning and cook slowly for 2 hours. Melt the shortening in a skillet; add flour, onion and paprika. Brown as you would for gravy, then gradually add I cup of water to make thin gravy and cook about 5 minutes longer. When beans are cooked, add this to the large kettle. Add the sour cream and vinegar, then stir just before serving.


Sour Cream String Bean Soup

I lb. string beans, cut into bite size pieces

2 quarts cold water ½ pint sour cream I teaspoon white vinegar I tablespoon flour Salt & white pepper to taste 2 bay leaves

In a large pot, cook the green beans with bay leaves in salt until tender. In a bowl, add flour to sour cream and blend well. Add the liquid from the beans to the sour cream mixture and blend. Slowly pour this over the beans, stirring constantly. Season, then stir in the vinegar. Serve hot to your guests.

TRIVIA ANSWER: One Hungarian New Year's food tradition is bean soup, which dates back to Hungary's Oueen Beatrice, daughter of Ferrante d'Aragonia, King of Naples. Italian influences are in many Hungarian dishes, one such dish being bean soup, or bab leves. According to both the Italians and Hungarians, the individual beans are similar to coins seen in the medieval era, and cooking something that resembled coins brought prosperity into the home.

Eligibility Rules for Year 2011 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual Life Benefit Member of William Penn Association for four (4) years. A Life Benefit Member is an individual who is insured for life or endowment benefits.
- b) On both renewal and new applications, the applicant must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2011 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a Life Benefit Member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2011.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
- d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period. The student must notify the President of the Scholarship Foundation, by letter, postmarked no later than **Wednesday**, **June 1**, **2011**, that the student desires to receive a scholarship grant. It is recommended that the letter be sent via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date. **E-Mail notification will NOT be accepted as proof of notification.**
 - e) First-time applicants must submit the following:
- I. **WPA Scholarship Application** on forms furnished by the Scholarship Foundation. Forms may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer entitled: "What Community, Charitable or Volunteer Act Were You Involved with in the Last 12 Months?"

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Wednesday, June 1, 2011.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. A copy of the student's SAT/ACT scores or waiver letter from the school in which enrolled.
- 5. Proof of enrollment for the coming school year in September.

Items 3, 4 and 5 must be submitted by Friday, September 30, 2011.

- f) Renewal applicants must submit the following:
 - I. A letter requesting a renewal grant.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer entitled: "What Community, Charitable or Volunteer Act Were You Involved with in the Last 12 Months?"

The Renewal Letter and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Wednesday, June 1, 2011.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain no lower than a 2.5 cumulative Grade Point Average on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the new term in September.

Items 3 and 4 must be submitted by Friday, September 30, 2011.

- g) All requests for an application and renewal letters must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Letters submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. E-Mails will NOT be accepted.
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided **the student** is a member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.
- k) All applications and renewal letters must be postmarked no later than **Wednesday**, **June 1**, **2011**. Any applications or renewal letters postmarked after that date will not be considered.

Hungary defends new media law as it assumes EU presidency

The Hungarian government began 2011 defending it's controversial new media act, which has been harshly criticized by Hungarian and international media, foreign governments, the European Union and human rights organizations.

The new law creates the National Media and Communications Authority (NMHH) which controls private television and radio broadcasters, newspapers and online news sites. Under the law, the government can fine broadcasters more than \$900,000, and newspapers and news websites about \$116,000, if their coverage is deemed unbalanced, "offensive to human dignity" or against the "public interest, public morals or order" by the media authority, whose five members all belong to the ruling Fidesz party.

Widespread Criticism. Criticism of the new law has been widespread

Hungary's leading newspaper, Népszabadság, announced in a frontpage headline: "The freedom of the press in Hungary has come to an end." The headline was printed in all 23 official languages of the EU.

The International Press Association (IPA) warned the law "provides for the far reaching political control of media content." It said the new law can force journalists to reveal their sources in cases related to national security and that all media must now register before they can operate, with the possibility of licenses being suspended or withdrawn if the media authority believes they have breached the law.

Others have criticized the law's provisions as being too vague and thus open to abuse for political pur-

Former Belgian Prime Minister Guy Verhofstadt, a current member of the European Parliament, bashed the law, saying, "the time of Pravda is over. This new law is unacceptable. Hungary must explain, and the [EU] Commission must act."

The French government requested Hungary amend its media law, with

a French spokesman saying the law changes "freedom of the press with deep effects."

The controversy comes at the same time Hungary assumes the rotating presidency of the EU. Some have questioned whether Hungary's role as EU president should be limited and even whether it should take on the EU presidency at all.

The German government opposed Hungary holding negotiations over media issues with Eastern partner countries during its EU presidency, citing the new media law as its rea-

Orbán Goes on Offensive. Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán struck back at such criticism, calling it "unnecessary and hasty interference" and accusing Germany and France of insulting his country just as it took on the EU presidency.

"It's not up to the French or the Germans" to say whether the Hungarian law complies with EU regulations," Orbán said. "The EU should decide."

"If the EU deems it necessary that the media law be altered, then we shall accept it," Orbán said. But, he added the new law will not be changed until other European countries do the same to their laws. "I cannot imagine that the EU says this or that passage of the Hungarian media act should be amended while the French, German or Danish media acts remain unchanged because they have the same passages."

The European Commission had requested more information on the law to determine whether it complies with European Union law, and on Jan. 4 the Hungarian Justice Ministry sent the Commission an English translation of the act. However, Hungarian news portal Portfolio.hu reported the following day that the translation was not complete and that several crucial sections were missing.

Orbán said he found the controversy amusing, but admitted it was a "bad start" for Hungary's EU presidency. "I did not write this script," he said.
