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

Tibor's take on Easter Mass doesn't match reader's

Dear Tibor,

I was surprised and a bit angered by your article in the May 2012 issue of William Penn Life about Easter liturgy. The experience you described runs so contrary to my own.

In my own parish church, which I attend regularly, an atmosphere of silence, respect and attention is maintained before the liturgy, certainly throughout the liturgy and even after the liturgy concludes. Those in attendance recognize the church as God's special dwelling among us and show universal respect for the church. Our ushers work to maintain this respectful attitude among the congregation. The priest celebrant and ministers also are in the back of church well before the liturgy is to begin and help maintain this atmosphere.

As for technology making inroads into the church, most parishes, my own included, remind people, in the bulletin and with an announcement before each liturgy, that all cell

phones and other electronic devices are to be turned off and packed away during the liturgy, out of respect for God and their fellow worshippers.

When it comes to dress, while I see that even our dress in church has been negatively affected by our "dress down" and "anything goes" culture, I observe my priests regularly reminding us, publicly and privately, of what constitutes proper dress for the liturgy. And, on Easter, most of the people I observed were dressed in their very best for this important day.

Reflecting on your experience described in your article, I hit upon two points which I ask you to ponder.

First of all, you really were not in church. You were only in the vestibule.

Why? Because you arrived on Húsvét, the most important date in the liturgical calendar and a feast on which you say you "realize that many infrequent worshippers make it a point to attend at least this one day in a year," just 10 minutes prior to the beginning of Mass. So, you end up outside of the church proper with many of those "infrequent visitors."

Finally, ponder this point, suggested by your remarks about the Sign of Peace.

When the Cleveland Browns do make it to the Super Bowl, I doubt that you and your father will plan to arrive at your seats just 10 minutes before kick off is scheduled. Your interest and knowledge of football will get you to your seats with lots of time to spare before kick off. And I am sure they will be good seats, because you realize that what you see is determined to a great extent from your vantage point.

It's the same with church attendance.

More dollars for scholars

State fraternal alliances seeking applicants for grants

PITTSBURGH -- Young WPA members who are residents of either California, New England, New Jersey or New York may be eligible for scholarship grants being awarded by several state fraternal alliances

California

The California Fraternal Alliance (CFA) will be awarding a minimum of two \$500 grants through its Ron Gill Scholarship program.

The program is open to California residents who are full-time students entering their sophomore, junior or senior year at an accredited college, university or vocational/technical school. Applicants must also be a member, or child of a member, of a fraternal benefit society which holds membership in the CFA.

In addition to the application, each applicant must submit an essay of 500 words or less explaining why they are deserving of the award.

The CFA scholarship award is for one year only and winners will not be eligible for a second award. All winners will be notified by Oct. 1, 2012, and the awards will be made payable to both the student and their school.

All application materials must be submitted by Sept. 1, 2012.

New Jersey-New York

The New Jersey-New York Fraternal Alliance (NJNY FA) is offering its Youth Volunteer Award. The award is given to deserving young students from a member fraternal society, based on the student's volunteer achievements within their society as well as in the community at large.

Each NINY FA award winner will receive \$500, and an additional \$500 will be donated to the charity of their



FA Convention book. To qualify, the applicant must be a resident of New Jersey or New York, be a member of a fraternal society within the NJNY FA and be between the ages of 16 and 22 at the time of

application.

All applications must be postmarked by Sept. 1, 2012. The winner(s) will be announced at the 79th Annual NJNY FA Convention to be held in Atlantic City, N.J., on Oct. 4 and 5.

New England

The New England Fraternal Alliance (NEFA) will be awarding three \$500 scholarships to students entering their sophomore, junior or senior year in college or entering graduate school. One of the awards is named in memory of Pearl Plants, a loval and tireless worker for the NEFA.

Applicants for the NEFA awards must be full-time students, a resident of New England and a member (or child of a member) of a fraternal benefit society that holds a membership in the NEFA.

Criteria to be used in judging includes overall merit, cumulative grade average, college activities and honors, community activities, financial need and an essay.

The deadline for submitting applications for the NEFA scholarship is Sept. 15, 2012. Recipients will be notified by Oct. 15.

Life insurance

Understanding our terminology helps ensure you get the right coverage for your needs

LIFE INSURANCE TERMS can be confusing for those who do not work in the industry. I thought this would be a good time to offer a quick refresher on some common terms that may describe the products you've chosen to help secure you family's future.

Fraternal Benefit Society: An organization that provides benefits to members, including insurance, on a not-for-profit basis. William Penn Association is a fraternal benefit society.

Cash Value: The money that can build up in a permanent life insurance certificate. This cash value grows on a tax-deferred basis and can be borrowed or cashed in if needed.

Cash-Value Certificate: A permanent life insurance certificate that offers the potential for cash-value growth and lifelong protection. This contrasts with Term Life Insurance (*see below*), which accumulates no cash value and expires at the end of the term without value. Types of cash-value insurance include Whole Life, Universal Life and Variable Life.

Conversion Privilege: A right contained in some term life insurance certificates that allows you to convert to a cash-value certificate without evidence of insurability.

Premium: Your cost of insurance. Your premium is the amount you pay to keep your insurance in force for the specified term or period.



Rider: An attachment or amendment to an insurance certificate, generally one that expands or adds benefits (such as Waiver of Premium or Accidental Death Benefit provisions).

Term Life Insurance: Term life provides a death benefit only (no cash value) for a specific term, such as one, five, 10 or 20 years, or to a specific age, after which it expires without value. The initial premium is generally lower than cash-value certificates. However, the premium increases at each renewal.

Underwriting: The process of evaluating your application to determine its acceptability as a risk and, if acceptable, the rate you will pay.

Whole Life Insurance: A type of cash-value life insurance featuring lifelong coverage, with flexible death benefit and premium amounts, and competitive cash-value growth potential.

There and back again

SINCE I LAST WROTE, a great deal has happened in my professional life. Many people would find it quite boring, but that is okay. I had several experiences in my travels the past few months that impacted me as a young American-Hungarian. I am going to recap the past few months and include all that I have seen and done.

The first of my adventures took me to our nation's capital, Washington, D.C. Though my father cannot understand it, I really enjoy visiting that place and, one day, I would like to live there. There is something alluring about the bustle of the capital of not just the U.S. but of the free world. A stroll along Massachusetts Avenue yields a very real tapestry of peoples and cultures. Embassy Row is my favorite place to visit, even more than the typical tourist sites. There is such an unmistakable energy in the air, perhaps it is merely the natural result of being the epicenter of world politics and economies.

My travels took me to Washington for the 27th Annual International Model NATO, where my colleagues and I from Cleveland State University were competing against delegations from 27 other schools for a few prestigious awards. Our objective: to represent the nation of Romania as best as possible, debating, from Romania's perspective, a wide range of policy and security issues. To be brief, we were very successful. I won an award, as did five of my colleagues. There were a few moments of lighthearted fun however, and I want to share them with you.

Every university representing a country at the International Model NATO must visit and attend a briefing by a diplomat at the embassy of the nation they are representing. Thus, my colleagues attended such a briefing at the Romanian Embassy. I was unable to attend this briefing as my arrival in Washington was delayed by my legal studies. At the briefing, when discussing Romania's regional relations with its neighbours, one of my colleagues mentioned Hungary. All of a sudden, the diplomat paused and said: "Hungary...well...the Hungarians have been very, very, naughty recently." He was referring to the controversial new Hungarian constitution, which was just over a month old at the time. "Are there any Hungarians in the room?" he asked. After being informed that the token Magyar was flying in later that day, he then proceeded into a colorful discussion of how

Romania's Balkan policy is influenced by the fact that, if Romania legally recognizes an ethnic enclave elsewhere, the Szekelys are going to want recognition, too.

To make matters worse, one of my colleagues and friends was enjoying the fun a little too much. His name is Matej, and he was born in Bratislava, Slovakia. He and I traded many fun jabs during the trip. He would talk about places in Slovakia, and I would "correct" him with the "proper" Hungarian name. For example:

Matej: "When I was in Kosice this past summer..."

Tibor: "Don't you mean Kassa?"

Matej: "Anyway, so my friend from Komarno met me there..."

Tibor: "Don't you mean Komárom?"

Matej: "Shut up, Tibor."

If he ever challenged me, I would tell him to look at the map in my apartment. It is a map of the "true" Hungary, a map of 1885. There is no such thing as Slovakia on that map.

In May, I traveled to Chicago to attend the NATO Summit where I was chosen to serve as a Young Delegate. That trip was probably one of the most exciting experiences of my life. I was able to meet the Supreme Allied Commander-Europe (a post once held by Pres. Eisenhower), the Secretary General of NATO, Madeline Albright, Rahm Emanuel and many other dignitaries and

My question to you is, do you know what NATO is? If you do not, do you really care enough to know? Your answers to these questions are the source of much consternation among presidents, prime ministers and generals.

politicians. I was also working with young professionals representing Hungary at a NATO simulation.

During my trip to Chicago, I met two Hungarians. The first was the Honorary Consul to Hungary for Chicago, Kaarina Koskenalusta. She was a wonderful woman and was very kind. She was very glad to see young American-Hungarians still engaging in the culture and the heritage of Hungary.

My other Hungarian acquaintance was Dr. Peter Rada from Corvinus University. Dr. Rada and I had a long conversation over lunch about a variety of topics, but one remains in my memory most vividly. Perhaps motivated by academic curiosity, he asked: "So, does Hungary ever make it in the news over here?" I told him, regrettably, that if one was to turn on the six o'clock news, Hungary would never be mentioned, at all. I told him that local newspapers (Cleveland's Plain Dealer or the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*) may run a small snippet pertaining to Hungary pulled from one of the major news syndicates, but other than that, one would need to turn to specific media outlets for any sort of analysis. Dissapointing, I know, because such a reality means one thing: Americans and American-Hungarians are probably grossly uninformed about issues facing our ancestral homeland. I can only hope that my conversations with Dr. Rada undermined his previous conceptions of American youth.

This month, I am crossing the Atlantic for the first time in my life. I will be attending the NATO Youth Summit in Brussels, Belgium. My university is one of only two educational institutions from the U.S. chosen to go. While I will definitely feel as though I am a fish out of water, I relish the opportunity to meet new people, some of whom I hope will be Hungarian. Surprisingly, flights from Brussels to Budapest are very inexpensive. Perhaps time and money will permit me to visit Budapest while I am in Europe. One can hope, right?

<u>Did you know</u> they're Hungarian?

A few weeks ago, my édes anyám and I were organizing and culling my collection of boyhood books and toys.

I noticed a group of *Little Golden Books* that were rubber banded together. As I opened each one of them, I began to take an exciting trip down memory lane. They were my favorites. I bet for many of you they were a wonderful part of your childhood as well.

Do recall such wonderfully illustrated tales as Tootle the Train, Scuffy the Tugboat and The Little Red Caboose? Each edition told a delightful story, even if one did not know how to read. The inanimate characters in each book were portrayed with human-like characteristics.

As I gazed at the books and thought about my childhood, I noticed the illustrator was a man named Tibor Gergely. After some internet research, I found out that he was born in Budapest in 1900. His father died when he was only nine years old. His mother had to work long hours in a factory to support the family.

He always loved to draw and was quite mischievous. He once was expelled from school for drawing an amusing caricature of Emperor Franz Joseph on the chalkboard. Other than a short semester of art instruction, Gergely was self taught.

He married the well-known Hungarian poet Anna Lesznai. Although she was 15 years his senior, she was his early financial backer.

In 1921, he moved to Vienna, where he established himself as a fine illustrator of German and Hungarian publications and books. In the early 1930's, Tibor moved back to Hungary and spent several years with Anna in the town of Kortvelyes. There he began to work in oil painting. His acclaimed artwork earned him a membership into a loosely organized amalgam of artists, poets and musicians who called themselves "The Sunday Circle." (Balazs, Lukacs and Bartok were members of this group as well.)

When Hitler began to assimilate Poland, Czecho-slovakia and Austria, Gergely realized that it was only a matter of time before Hungary would become part of Nazi domination and thus would end intellectual freedom for the eclectic community. So in 1939, Tibor came to New York and immediately began to illustrate for the Simon and Schuster publishing house. When the idea for *Little Golden Books* was conceived, Gergely, became the marquee illustrator and remained there for decades. He also was the chief artist for such periodicals as *The Free World*.

Gergely continued to add his artwork to countless books and magazines. He died in New York City on January 13, 1978.

Needless to say, I kept my Little Golden Books that were illustrated by Tibor Gergely.

Your summer panti

FÁRADJON BE A MAGYAR KONYHÁBA!

This is the coldest start to summer I remember in a long time. On the positive side, it does keep the bugs away during dusk into the early evening. Do not forget this month is the WPA Golf Tournament July 20 and 21 at Chestnut Ridge in Blairsville, Pa. Housekeeping is light this month. Into the kitchen, we go....

Before we continue building the summer pantry--so you may enjoy more meals outside with less hassle--let us look at the type of heat source available. You can barbecue with charcoal or gas.

Folks have been grilling with charcoal since the 1950's, when barbecue became popular. The charcoal burns, creating red-hot embers that cook your food. You can enhance the flavor with some simple additions. After the coals are glowing, add some flavored wood chips that are soaked in water. Wood chips add flavor first by creating a flavored smoke that envelops the food you are grilling. When the chips lose their moisture content, they burn up, creating additional taste. Visit any hardware or building supply store (like Lowe's or Home Depot) to get wood chips. Some popular flavors are mesquite, cherry wood, apple wood and pecan. The aroma will also take away the smell of the charcoal, adding a friendlier fragrance to your backyard, patio or deck.

The next thing to do is clean the grate or grid on which you will place the food while it cooks. It should be clean and free of any crusty materials. Wipe it off using a steel scrubby or grill brush, eliminating food particles from your last event. After placing the grate back on the charcoal or gas grill and before starting fire, rub a light coating of cooking oil so the food will not stick when you begin grilling. You may also use pan spray to accomplish the same task.

Chef Vilmos and I have come up with many helpful tips to improve your outdoor cooking.

- Try different rubs, adding extra flavor to the meats you are grilling. Remember, add flavor wherever you can to improve the quality of your food. There are different salts you can use--such as garlic salt, celery salt and sea salt--which give exceptional style to your grilled meats or vegetables.
- In the same vein, use marinades to boost flavor. Different liquids--such as Worcestershire or white Worcestershire sauces, white balsamic vinegar, apple cider and lemonade--make great marinades for chicken, beef and pork. Marinate your meats overnight before grilling, and you will experience better tasting food.
- •Instead of using a whole steak, chicken or pork loin, why not use smaller pieces that will cook faster? Use chicken drumsticks or wings, or chunks of beef or pork, that you marinated and topped with your favorite sauce or glaze. Make shish kabobs or satays (meat on a bamboo skewer) so your guests can sample all you have prepared for them.



- Add fresh salads that will compliment the meat you are grilling for your guests. Try using baby spinach, arugula or mesclun mix as an alternative to iceberg lettuce.
- For dessert, make a fresh fruit salad or serve strawberry shortcakes with freshly whipped cream to finish your meal.

No matter what you prepare, your guests will appreciate all your efforts and the food you serve.

Hungarian Potato Salad

10 medium white potatoes

3 hard-boiled eggs, chopped

½ cup minced celery

½ cup minced red pepper

1/2 cup minced white onions

3/4 cup white vinegar

I to 2 cups sour cream

I tablespoon kosher salt

I teaspoon black pepper

I teaspoon granulated garlic

tablespoon Hungarian Paprika

2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Cut potatoes into medium cubes and cook until they are fork tender but not mushy. Place the potatoes on a sheet pan and sprinkle the onions over the potatoes. Sprinkle the 3/4 cup of white vinegar over the potatoes and let them cool. In a large mixing bowl, combine half the sour cream with the salt, pepper and garlic, mixing well. Stir in the chopped eggs, celery and red peppers. If the mixture needs more sour cream, add it and stir well. If the mixture is too thick, add a little more white vinegar. Pour this mixture over the potatoes in a large serving bowl. Taste and adjust seasoning then chill until ready to serve your guests. Garnish with parsley before serving.

Cucumber Salad

3 medium cucumbers, peeled & sliced thin

2 teaspoons kosher salt

3 tablespoons cider vinegar

3 tablespoons water

I teaspoon brown sugar

I teaspoon Hungarian Paprika

I garlic clove, minced

Salt & pepper to taste



In a mixing bowl, slice cucumbers thin and sprinkle with 2 tablespoons salt. Let stand for 45 minutes. In another bowl combine all the ingredients and adjust the seasoning. After 45 minutes, drain any excess liquid from the cucumbers and pour dressing over the slices. Chill until ready to serve your guests.

Cabbage Salad

I small head green cabbage I small white onion, finely diced I red pepper, finely diced I tablespoon kosher salt 1/2 cup cider vinegar ½ cup salad oil 2 tablespoons brown sugar Salt & pepper to taste

Shred the cabbage and toss in a mixing bowl with one tablespoon salt. Let stand for one hour. Salt will draw out water from the cabbage. Drain liquid from the cabbage. In another mixing bowl, combine the vinegar, oil and brown sugar to make the dressing. Toss dressing over the shredded cabbage and mix well. Stir in the diced onion and red pepper. Adjust the seasoning to your taste then refrigerate until ready to serve your guests.

Fruit Salad

7 cups mixture of freshly sliced fruit: watermelon balls sliced bananas

peach and/or pear chunks blueberries strawberries raspberries pitted cherries seedless grapes orange segments pink grapefruit sections 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar Boston Bibb lettuce leaves 7 teaspoons rum, cognac or Riesling

Dip bananas, peach and pear slices into lemon juice to prevent darkening. In a large mixing bowl, combine the bananas, peaches and pears with all your other fruits. Toss gently then sprinkle with confectioners' sugar. Chill the fruit for one hour. Shape the lettuce leaves into round cups and spoon the fruit into each cup. Top with your choice of liquor and serve cold to your guests.

Hungarian Barbecue Glaze

2 cups white balsamic vinegar I tablespoon Hungarian sweet paprika ½ teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon white pepper

In a small saucepan, simmer the balsamic vinegar until it reduces by half. Stir in the paprika, salt and pepper. Let cool then brush on chicken or pork after cooking and before serving.

Orange Honey Glaze

½ cup honey ½ cup orange juice I cup light brown sugar

In a saucepan, combine all ingredients and heat until well blended. Cool then brush on chicken or pork after the meat is cooked. Serve hot to your guests.

Beyond sunscreen

More than your skin needs special care during the summer

HAPPY JULY! Summer is here! Time for vacations and family fun. But summertime fun in the sun comes with its own set of precautions. Last summer, we talked about the types of sun screens to protect your skin, but more than your skin needs protection.

Protecting Your Eyes. Are your sunglasses doing their job to protect your eyes? "Sunglasses that don't block 99 to 100 percent of UV light are worse than no sunglasses at all," says the chief of ophthalmology at New York Presbyterian Hospital. The darker the lenses, the more your pupils dilate, allowing even more light in. To find a protective pair, check the UV sticker. If it says only "UV protection" with no number, that pair may offer as little as 50 percent protection. Make sure your brand states 99 to 100 percent UV protection.

Go BIG! Larger lenses block more light and protect the eyelid and surrounding skin. If you can find a wraparound style you like to block glare from the sides, that's even better. The color of the lenses is no indicator of the level of protection. Price is also not a good indicator of UV protection. I found a pair at the mall I liked; they were \$200 but only had 70 percent UV protection. Later that same day, I found a pair at the flea market for \$5 that had 100 percent protection.

Protecting Your Hair. Your hair needs protection from the sun's rays, too. Ultraviolet rays don't just damage your skin; they dry out your hair, fade your color and take away the overall shine. Here are some tips to keep your hair looking great.

 Always wet your hair with tap water before diving in the pool or charging into the surf. Wet hair will soak up less chlorine or salt than dry hair.

 And don't forget about your scalp. Apply at least an SPF 30 on your "part" every time you reapply sunscreen.

Avoiding Dehydration. The summer sun and heat can also lead to dehydration. Staying hydrated will help you maintain your energy through all your summer adventures. If you don't drink enough, you could experience headache, fatigue, cramps and--in the most extreme situations--life-threatening shock. If you plan to be active for more than two hours in the sun and heat, hydration becomes even more critical. For example, you can lose up to two quarts of fluid per hour hiking in the heat. So how much water should you bring on your hike? Take the number of hours you and your friends plan on being active, divide that by two and multiply by the number of people in your group. (e.g., 2 hours of hiking \div 2 × 4 people hiking = 4 liters of water, or 1 liter per person.)

For all day outings, consider an electrolyte enhanced sports drink, like Gatorade, to help replace the minerals that keep your brain, heart and other other muscles running smoothly. If you prefer to stick with water, bring along munchies, to snack on every hour instead. Any munchie works as long as they have some salt for your electrolyte balance and carbs for fuel. I find there is nothing like good old raisins and peanuts. They are salty, lightweight and high in energy.

Enjoy all that summer has to offer: lazy days at the beach or park, a week in the cool mountains or even a trip to some exotic island. Be smart and stay safe. Make Summer 2012 one you will remember with a smile, not one you want to forget.



Privacy - Personal Financial and Medical Information

Dear Member:

Protecting the privacy of your personal, financial and medical information has always been and will continue to be a matter of top priority for us. When used in this notice, the following terms have the meaning shown.

- * Public Information means information that we believe is lawfully available to the general public from: Federal, State or local government records; widely distributed media; or, disclosures to the general public that are required to be made by Federal, State or local law.
- * Non-Public Information means personally identifiable financial and medical information. It also means any list, description or other grouping of individuals, and publicly available information pertaining to them, that is derived from any personally identifiable information that is not publicly available.
- * Consumer Reporting Agency means an entity which regularly provides reports (Consumer Reports) including information regarding an individual's: general reputation, character, personal characteristics or mode of living and financial status. The information may be obtained through interviews with the individual or third parties such as the individual's business associates, family members, friends, neighbors, acquaintances or financial sources.

We obtain information about you from the following sources:

- * information that you provide to us in an application or other form;
- * information about your transactions with us (such as premium payments, loans, claims, etc.) or others; and
 - * information that we may receive from a Consumer Reporting Agency.

We do not disclose any personal, Non-Public Information about you to anyone, except as permitted or required by law. We will not disclose personal medical information about you, except as permitted by law or as you may authorize.

We restrict access to your personal, insurance and medical information to those of our employees who need to know that information in order to provide insurance or service to you. We are, and will continue to be, vigilant in the safeguarding of your personal, financial and medical information. We maintain physical, electronic and procedural safeguards to comply with Federal and State regulations regarding the safeguarding of Non-Public Information.
