# Treasured Recipes with Chef Vilmos

# Wintertime is soup time

MOTHER NATURE has left no doubt that we are in the thick of winter. We must have done something to upset her as this new year has been, for the most part, extraordinarily, bitterly cold. And it's not just us lucky folks in the north who have been the beneficiaries of Mother Nature's frigid favoritism; she has generously spread the Arctic experience to most of the nation.

It's times like these that make me even happier to be in the kitchen. I love when my kitchen windows get foggy; it's visual evidence of the warmth being generated by my oven. It makes me feel extra toasty...and even gladder to be indoors!

Of course, this is the time of year when everyone appreciates a big, steaming bowl of piping-hot homemade soup. Now, I have a confession to make: my wife is the soup master in the family, and lately she's been "hitting it out of the park," as they say in baseball. I mean she has been on a serious roll with the ladle, making one fantastic soup after another. She also has made some hearty breads to go along with her soups. Believe you me, I have had no problem stepping aside and letting her take control of the kitchen. Besides, who has enjoyed the fruits of her labor? Let's just say I've had to loosen my belt a notch.

Soup and bread: a perfect combination to take some of the chill off of winter. Below are some recipes you can try to warm up your family. They come from A Taste of Hungarian Heaven, WPA's outstanding cookbook, available for a \$20 donation to our Scholarship Foundation.

### **String Bean Soup** with Sour Cream

I pound fresh string beans, snipped & cut into 1-inch pieces

6 cups vegetable stock

2 teaspoons kosher salt

3 whole cloves garlic on toothpick

I teaspoon vinegar

3 pats butter

I small onion, diced fine

I teaspoon paprika

2 tablespoons chopped parsley

4 tablespoons flour

I cup sour cream

In a large saucepan, drop beans into vegetable stock and add salt, garlic and vinegar. Simmer until the beans are nearly tender. Remove from heat and set aside. In another saucepan, melt the butter and cook the onion until it turns translucent. Add the paprika, parsley and flour; stir until the roux is done, about 5 minutes. Dilute the roux with a cup of your vegetable stock and continue adding all the stock into the roux. Add the beans and continue cooking until the beans are tender. Take the soup off heat and let cool. Remove the garlic cloves on toothpick from the soup. Mix 3 tablespoons of the soup into the sour cream until you have a smooth liquid. Slowly pour the sour cream mixture back into the soup. Season to taste with salt and white pepper. Bring soup back to a simmer and serve.



### Squash Soup

4 cups butternut or acorn squash cut into ½-inch cubes

I quart milk

2-finger pinch nutmeg

2 teaspoons sugar

8 slices white bread, crusts removed & lightly toasted.

I cup heavy cream

I cup medium-dry sherry

Salt & white pepper

In a large saucepan, combine the squash, milk, sugar and nutmeg. Simmer over medium heat until squash is soft, but don't let the milk boil over, about 20 to 30 minutes. Add bread to soup and simmer for another 5 minutes. Remove from heat and purée soup in a blender. If you want a finer grain soup, strain it through a fine-mesh strainer. Put back in saucepan on stove and add the cream and the sherry, bringing mixture back to a simmer. If soup is too thick, thin down with more milk. Adjust seasoning to taste, then serve your guests.

### **German Dark Rye Bread**

3 cups sifted all-purpose flour

2 envelopes active dry yeast

1/4 cup cocoa powder

I tablespoon caraway seed

2 cups water

1/3 cup molasses

2 tablespoons butter or margarine

I tablespoon granulated sugar

I tablespoon kosher salt

3 to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  cups rye flour

Preheat over to 400°F. In a large mixing bowl, combine flour, yeast, cocoa powder and caraway seed until well blended. In a saucepan, put water, molasses, butter, sugar and salt. Heat until just warm, stirring all the while. Add contents of saucepan to mixing bowl and beat on low speed with an electric mixer. Scrape sides of bowl down while mixing for 45 seconds. Beat on high speed for 3 minutes. By hand, stir in enough rye flour to make a soft dough. Turn onto a floured surface and knead until very smooth. Cover with a damp towel and let set for 20 minutes. Punch down and divide dough in half. Shape each half into a round loaf and place on a greased pie plate. Brush surface with a little cooking oil and score the top of each loaf with a sharp knife. Let rise until double in size. Bake for 30 minutes or until done. Remove from plate and cool on rack. Makes 2 loaves.

Historical preservation

A STACK OF BOOKS lies in my apartment, collecting dust. I call it my "to-do" pile because it is composed of books that I have yet to read. This past winter break, I read one book from the pile, a book on anthropology entitled Collapse: How Societies Choose to Fail or Succeed by Jared Diamond, an author of several bestselling books on popular scientific topics for a general audience. In his book, Diamond surveys several currently existing and extinct civilizations, trying to determine why certain societies thrive while others go the way of the dodo. What I learned from that book inspired this month's Take.

To be sure, I am not going to make the same tired conclusions that have been made by many American-Hungarians (yours truly included) that the diasporic culture of the Magyars of North America is quickly dying off. Instead, Diamond's work made me think of a different issue. He describes how scientists have to postulate on many of the finer details and complexities of many extinct cultures because there are no written records about these cultures: no books, no writings, no alphabet. Thus, Diamond writes, it is left to modern scholars to take whatever meager physical evidence remains (in the form of clay pots, bones, etc.), draw whatever conclusions they can and just guess at the rest.

This observation made me wonder: If the American-Hungarian community continues to exist into the future, what will our descendants know in terms of what our heritage looked like? Felt like? Tasted like? Sounded like? I thought of some extinct societies and wondered if those peoples had thought, as we do now, that their various traditions, stories and other components of their civilization would

persevere throughout the ages, never thinking that their feeble attempts to memorialize their culture would be swept away by time and the elements? I thought that we, too, may be falling into such a cognitive trap.

After all, photographs, newspaper clippings, postcards, records and tapes do not last forever. Rather, some of these historical technologies persist for only a few years before decaying.

I realized I have no idea what a Hungarian wedding actually sounded like in 1912 or what a filledto-capacity Sunday morning Hungarian church would look like. Instead, I only have a vague idea, some cloudy, hazy concept distilled from secondhand accounts of what people know about such events. This regrettable fact is the fault of no person or group: the technology was simply not widely available to preserve the complexities of these memories and timeless occasions. We are lucky to have what few photographs and written articles still survive.

But, today, there is no excuse for failing to preserve historical knowledge of our culture. Technology now exists to quickly and easily transfer physical documents (and even vinyl records) to electronic files that can be stored en masse on USB drives, external hard drives or small cards known as SD cards. From there, these files can be retained on those computer drives, or can be copied in a matter

of minutes to another drive, or they can be uploaded to a server or other location and thus be stored "in the cloud." This last option holds the most promise: for better or worse, the Internet is here to stay, and information stored on the Internet can, if handled properly, exist for the rest of human civilization.

To be sure, observing the need for greater his-

To be sure, observing the need for greater historical preservation does not mean that other people have not been doing the same thing. One Youngstown, Ohio, area resident, Kalman, videotaped many American-Hungarian events long before I was born. By giving copies of these tapes to my family, Kalman has allowed me to hear the voices and see the ceremonies of decades past. His tapes are a gift to not just historians or ethnographers but also all descendants of our culture.

Other individuals engage in this sort of historical preservation as well. I know of a man in Western Pennsylvania who records and catalogs live performances of Hungarian music.

Then, there's my father. My father takes photographs. Lots. Of. Photographs. Even though it may drive our family crazy at times, my father has deftly assembled a photographic record of every event that our family has attended over the past few years. Helpfully, these photographs are all on electronic storage devices, enabling easy sharing, editing and copying.

These three examples (and I am sure that there are more) indicate how the trappings of our culture may survive far into the future. But, how do *we* make historical preservation work into the future?

Now, the history of our heritage is like a shattered glass, fragmented into many little pieces. Some pieces are larger than others, like the archives of the Cleveland Hungarian Heritage Museum. Some are small, like the private collections of elderly immigrants, with only a few sacred photos, trinkets or records to memorialize each person's own private saga.

The more I ruminate on the nature of our culture, the more I realize that the true nature of our heritage is not in the broad, general historical narrative crafted by professors or authors, but in the hundreds and thousands of individual stories that burn bright for a brief period of time, like a spark in the night air.

Truth resides not in the mosaic, but the individual pieces of which it is composed. But, when the individual pieces crack, fall out or fade, the entire mosaic begins to wither.

This is what this month's column proposes: to save the little pieces.

Going forward, this would largely take a centralized effort of some sort. Sure, individuals could scan and burn music and photos to electronic media on their own terms. But beyond that, there is the secondary problem of ensuring that even the electronic media exists, to avoid the inevitable shoebox full of CDs thrown away upon a move or an estate sale.

In short, what the American-Hungarian community needs is a central repository for its historical information, that patchwork quilt of more than 150 years of baptisms, weddings, suppers, festivals and funerals--the guideposts of the rich lives of Magyars that need preservation, that *deserve* preservation. If such a repository exists, then the local clubs of our community need to work with that repository. If one does not exist, then it may be necessary to create one. Otherwise, the vast historical knowledge, the depth of the American-Hungarian experience, may be lost with the long passage of time.

Time is running out: photos decay; records get worn out; memories fade. The time to work to preserve our heritage is now. Without our own individual efforts, the collective history of our community could be lost for time immemorial. Unlike the many other factors that affect our heritage on a daily basis, this is one that we can control.

RESERVATIONS are now being accepted for the 2014 WPA tour of Hungary which will focus entirely inside the present day borders of Hungary. The WPA tour will depart from Pittsburgh on Saturday, Sept. 13, and include 13 days and 12 nights in and around Budapest and other towns inside of Hungary.

Here is an overview of the itinerary:

- Dinner on a Danube River boat cruise.
- Free time to explore Budapest.

- Boat trip on Lake Balaton, visit Balatonfüred and Tihany, Bory Castle in Székesfehérvár, peasant wedding party in Lovas Csárda.
- Visit Veszprém and the Herend Porcelain factory, attend the Reformed Age Days Festival that has a 19th Century theme, cross the Danube, view a live horse show in Varga Tanya.
- Visit Kecskemét and its City Hall.

• Travel to northeastern Hungary to visit the Tokaj Wine growing region.

 Travel to Nyíreygháza and Máriapócs, pálinka distillery and farewell dinner in hotel.

We will stay in beautiful hotels, travel in an air-conditioned bus and have an English-speaking guide. Breakfast daily and one other meal daily is included in the land tour price. Some mornings are free for optional sightseeing tours and shopping for folk art.

For the second year in a row, we have adjusted the payment method to better meet the needs of our travelers, and so we require separate payments for the flights and land tour.

The land tour payments must be made payable to William Penn Association and must be paid in full by May 30. The land tour price for WPA life benefit members is \$1,740 for double occupancy and \$2,239 for single occupancy. Non-members must add \$500 to the land tour price. - I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.williampennassociation.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. A copy of the student's SAT/ACT scores or waiver letter from the school in which enrolled.
- 5. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3, 4 and 5 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- f) **Renewal applicants** must submit the following:
  - I. A letter requesting a renewal grant.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the questions: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Renewal Letter and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
  - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- g) All applications, renewal letters and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed submissions will NOT be accepted.**
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.



# The Darlington House

As we celebrate WPA's 128th anniversary, I thought it would be interesting to learn a little more about the center of operations of our beloved fraternal insurance organization, a historic building known as the Darlington House.

Ornately carved woodworking adorns the building that sits upon about a half acre in the former city of Allegheny, now known as the Allegheny West section of Pittsburgh. The focal point of this spacious home is an elaborate hardwood staircase that wraps around from the lobby to the second floor. The Darlington House was one of the first homes in the area to have an elevator. (See the July 2010 issue of William Penn Life for a photographic tour.)

Often times, the story of a particular home is overshadowed by the personal lives and inappropriate behaviors of the family that lived there. Such is the case with the beautiful 31-room brick home with slate roof and adjacent garage that serves as WPA's Home Office.

The property was formed from three lots, originally owned by James and Margaret Graham and James McCutcheon. The house and two-story garage were built in 1909 for \$60,000 and \$9,000, respectively. The buildings were designed by noted Pittsburgh architect George S. Orth and constructed by W. F. Trimble and Sons. The home was a wedding gift from Mr. and Mrs. Harry Darlington Sr. to their son and daughter-in-law, Harry and Lefreda (Weir) Darlington.

The Darlington family fortune was built mostly from the wise business and investment dealings of Harry Sr. Their fortune centered around steel, natural gas, a brewery and several other industries. The wives of both Harry Sr. and Harry Jr. came from families of social and monetary prominence in the Pittsburgh area. Both father and son were involved in several clubs and high society organizations not only in Western Pennsylvania but also in New York City.

Harry Jr. seemed to live in the shadows and within the vigilant eye of his father. Harry Sr. even lived on the same street, Irwin Avenue (which later became Brighton Road). Harry Jr. married his first wife in London in 1908. Although his family was of high society in Pittsburgh, Harry Jr.'s wedding merited only a brief article in a New York newspaper. The marriage, according to court documents and news accounts, was filled with scandal, lies and deception.

Every summer Harry Jr., his wife and their only child would summer in a posh resort area north of New York City. In 1913, Harry Jr., according to court documents, returned to Pittsburgh, leaving his wife and son at the resort. He ordered the locks to be changed at the 709 Brighton Road location. Servants were ordered to never admit his wife and child in the home again. In 1915, his wife filed for and was granted a divorce based on abandonment.

Mired in embarrassment from his failed first marriage, Harry Jr. married again in 1917, this time to Ethel Shields. A few months later, he joined the U.S. Army in the engineering corps and was shipped to France. He remained a soldier throughout World War I and was discharged in early 1919. He returned to Pittsburgh and lived a short time longer in his home before selling it to Robert and Marguerite (Singer) Milligan and moving back to the residence of his now deceased mother and father. In 1925, he sold his parents' home and moved to several other locations in the area. He continued to work from the same office that he occupied with his father until his passing in 1931 at the age of 43. He had one son from his second marriage.

The Milligans sold the home in 1940 to Carl and Grace Traubert, who converted the home into a furnished rooming house. Two years later, the home was purchased by The Catholic Knights of St. George (CKSG), a fraternal benefit society, and became the organization's home office. The Darlington House became WPA's Home Office in 1982 when the CKSG joined the WPA family. The home was extensively renovated to restore much of its original beauty.


