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

WPA-sponsored turkey dinner helped make families feel at home





This year's resolution: become a 'cultural ambassador'

THE ARRIVAL of a new calendar year brings with it the promise of renewal, progress and change. Many resolutions are made, and many resolutions are broken, but early January's spirit of rejuvenation rings true for all.

This year, I am taking an approach different from the mainstream of resolutions and promises. This coming year, I am going to try my best to be a "cultural ambassador," and I encourage you to do the same.

This concept occurred to me a few weeks ago while attending a performance of the Hungarian State Folk Ensemble at Playhouse Square. I purchased the tickets as a 20th birthday gift for my sister. The show was stunning and featured the artistic precision of both the dancers and musicians. As an international showcase of our culture, this artistic display made me proud of my ancestry.

We arrived about 30 minutes prior to the scheduled start time. I recognized several prominent members of our American-Hungarian community, but most attendees

were not of Magyar heritage.

As I perused the concert program, I examined several pages listing "program donors." The list included many recognizable surnames associated with the philanthropic community of Cleveland. Without their generous contributions, the resurgence of Playhouse Square would not have occurred. A few decades ago, this section of downtown was a forbidden zone for evening pedestrian traffic. Today, it is a miniature version of Broadway. My college of law at Cleveland State and place of employment lie in the middle of this vibrant section of urban resurgence. Many of the donors are well-known attorneys from powerful international law firms.

The ticket sales for this inspiring event could not have possibly covered the expenses incurred. I assumed this same philanthropic group provided the extra funds which allow events just like this to continue.

As my sister and I sat in eager anticipation of the performance, a distinguished gentleman and his wife sat next to me. He immediately introduced himself. After the usual questions and answers of a typical introduction, the conversation continued and became more distinct.

He was rather curious as to why a young man like me would attend such a performance. I explained the occasion and particulars. In turn, I asked him why he and his wife decided to attend this particular Thursday evening performance.

He said that he is a lifelong resident of the area, owned several businesses and is a contributor to many fundraising/philanthropic events. He further stated that complimentary tickets are normally given to donors of such causes and venues, but he usually gives his tickets to

employees, associates or friends.

I was curious about why he chose to attend this event in lieu of gifting his seats to another party. His answer was interesting to say the least.

He said he is of English and Welsh heritage, and his ancestors came to America more than 150 years ago. He wanted to know more about this little country named Hungary and wanted to learn about it through dance and music. He further stated that a summer trip to Hungary was on his to-do list for 2014.

Interestingly, he mentioned that he has been part of a group of investors that acquired several Hungarian factories and properties in the mid 1990s. In retrospect, he regretted never visiting Hungary in reference to business interests. Many of his colleagues have spent time in Hungary and were impressed by its charm, grace, food and people. Our conversation continued until the show began.

During intermission, my new friend asked for a few clarifications pertaining to the first half of the program. Many of his queries were linked to words mentioned in the program notes. My sister and I briefly explained terms such as *csárdás*, *verbunkos*, *cimbalom*, *Szeklers*, *Kalocsa* and *Somogy*. He was enamored by the music of Franz Liszt.

As we strolled back to our seats, he asked me how many times I have visited Hungary. He was surprised when I said zero. He assumed my knowledge of Hungarian culture, music and history came from a total immersion resulting from direct and extensive travels to Hungary. He was also surprised to learn that my conversational abilities in the Magyar language are rudimentary at best.

The second half of the performance was just as impressive as the first. As the curtain fell to end the performance, the gentleman thanked my sister and me for answering his many questions. We exchanged business cards, and he thanked me once again for my ambassadorial skills in portraying the romantic allure of Hungary. As we parted, he shook my hand and said he would visit Hungary next year.

Later that night, I thought about what I had just experienced. I thought about a particular word my new acquaintance has used: "ambassador." The word kept repeating itself in my head. After more contemplation and formulation, I concluded there are many enlightened American-Hungarians out there with an ecumenical mind-set concerning our heritage. Together, we follow the credo: "No matter what the event, as long as it is Magyar we will support the endeavor." I realized that these people are emissaries for anything Hungarian. Thus my idea about "cultural ambassadors" arose, from the hazy mist of a mind's twilight wanderings.

With this in mind, I thought more about experiences I had over the past summer. Three events in particular came to mind.

The first was the Gulyás Cook Off held on Father's Day. Most people in attendance were not Hungarian. Some came because of media exposure. Many others, however, patronized this event because of word of mouth endorsements passed on by cultural ambassadors. Many attendees were interested in the cultural and gastronomical aspects of Magyar-style gulyás. My siblings and I were proud representatives at this cooking competition and answered scores of questions covering a wide spectrum of Hungarian culture, history and cooking.

A second event attended by many non-Magyars was held at The Mall in Washington, D.C. This gathering was sponsored in part by The Smithsonian Center for Folklife and Cultural Heritage as well as the Balassi Institute. Held during late June and early July, this festival offered a showcase for Hungarian culture. Although I could not be a part of this event, I understand that most people in attendance came to learn about the people and culture of Hungary. Once again, cultural ambassadors represented our people in an admirable fashion.

Finally, in late August, 29 ethnic groups participated in The One World Day celebration at The Cleveland Cultural Gardens. A majority of the 10,000 people in attendance were not Hungarian, and all were exposed to the many diverse cultures of the community. My family also participated in the One World Festival, representing the Magyar Gardens. (See the July 2013 issue for more information on the Hungarian Garden). My brother played the cimbalom, and my sister baked and decorated red, white and green cookies. These sweet treats were given to children who accompanied their parents on this lovely Sunday afternoon. My family made more than five gallons of gulyás, much of which we gave to visitors as a "thank you" for coming to visit the garden.

Many times American-Hungarians spend too much time and effort preaching to the choir, myself included. Furthermore, I sometimes think that we Magyars too often focus our energies inward, especially on how we organize, plan and execute events.

By its very nature, a foreign culture is intimidating to the outsider. It's a bewildering frenzy of language, customs, history, food and tradition. To this end, I think we Hungarians trend too far into opacity. I worry when I hear Hungarians say that our events should only be for Hungarians, forgetting about anyone else. In a nation built on multiculturalism, such insularity will spell doom for our community.

Worse yet, such insularity is historically inaccurate: Hungarians have traditionally mingled with other cultures--Slovenes, Slovaks, Germans, Croats, Romanians, and others--both in the homeland and here in America. The beautiful cultural traditions of our heritage are not ours alone. They should be shared and spread throughout the world because our customs embody classic themes of community, love, conflict and hope in our own unique terms. That fact alone makes "cultural ambassadors" a necessity.

I am often reminded that it is usually not a grandiose melting-pot design that produces greater learning and understanding, but rather the small, everyday acts of people who go out of their way to share bits of their culture with each other. Granted, such evangelization should be tempered with prudence and class: just as we American-Hungarians revile aggressive cultural proselytizers, we must be careful to not become what we detest.

Therefore, during the coming year, I will be focusing my energies and my "Take" outward, working on the principles of inclusion, transparency and community. Instead of directing my creative energy inward, I will attempt to reach out to not only non-Hungarians but also those in our community who may be alienated, disinterested or disenfranchised. I will become an ambassador for my cultural community, and I encourage you all to do the same.

I medium onion, chopped

I kohlrabi (optional)

I teaspoon paprika

I quart water

Salt & pepper to taste

Cook the giblets, meat, carrots, parsley root and kohlrabi in one quart of water. Add salt and pepper. Cook until meat and vegetables are tender. Drain the liquid and set aside. Cut the vegetables and meat into small pieces. In a large skillet, melt one tablespoon of shortening and add the chopped onion. Cook until tender. Add parsley, then add the rice and liquid; cook until rice is done, adding more water if needed to prevent burning. When rice is done, add the cut-up meat and vegetables. Chicken may be substituted for goose or duck.

Borjú Tekercs (Veal Roll)

2 pounds veal shoulder

I rounded tablespoon shortening

I medium onion

I package plain gelatin

6 eggs, hard boiled

I teaspoon salt

I cup water

Cube the veal into small pieces. Chop the onion and fry it in the shortening until golden brown. Add the veal, salt



and water. Cook over very low heat until the meat is tender. Add the gelatin and mix well, then put mixture through a meat grinder. Moisten waxed paper well with water. Spread the meat on the waxed paper. Lay the hard-boiled eggs in the center lengthwise. Lift the waxed paper and roll the meat over the eggs, then wrap the waxed paper tightly over the rolled meat. Tie the two ends with a string. Put in refrigerator. When ready to serve, remove waxed paper and slice

Ham Schnitzel Hungarian Style

Ham steaks, fully cooked

Or smoked ham slices

3 medium onions, chopped

I cup water

I even tablespoon sweet paprika

½ teaspoon salt

Medium potatoes, peeled & cut into quarters, I per person

4 heaping tablespoons sour cream

2 even tablespoons flour

In a large skillet (with cover), or a Dutch oven, brown the ham steaks in a small amount of fat. Remove ham steaks and add the chopped onions. Sauté until nicely brown. Add the ham steaks, potatoes, salt, paprika and water. Cover and simmer for about 30 minutes until potatoes and ham are tender.

In a 2- to 3-cup capacity measuring cup or bowl, mix the flour with the sour cream and a little water. Stir until smooth and free of lumps. Add more water until the mixture reaches the consistency of melted vanilla ice cream. Add a tablespoon of the hot liquid from the skillet to this mixture. Stir until completely mixed. Repeat this procedure about five to six times. (This procedure is very important. It will assure you a smooth sauce which will not curdle.) Then, while stirring constantly, add the sour cream-flour mixture to the liquid in your skillet. Stir until smooth and thickened. Add more water if the gravy is too thick.

Be careful not to bring to a boil again to be sure your gravy does not curdle. Suggest to your guests that they try mashing up their potatoes and mixing in the gravy.

Pineapple Rice

I cup rice

I bag miniature marshmallows

I medium can crushed pineapple

½ cup sugar

½ pint heavy cream

Cook rice. Soak marshmallow pieces in crushed pineapple for one hour. Mix the cooked rice with the sugar and add the crushed pineapple. Whip the cream and stir into the entire mixture. Chill and serve.

Csoman, Molnar recognized during 53rd Hungarian Kongresszus

CLEVELAND -- WPA National Vice President-Fraternal Endre Csoman and Branch 14 member Mary Jane Molnar (pictured above) were recently honored for their efforts to preserve and promote Hungarian culture in America. Each received the Árpád Szövetség medal presented by the Hungarian Association (HA) during its 53rd Hungarian Kongresszus (Congress) held Nov. 29 to Dec. 1 in Cleveland.

In a letter to Mr. Csoman announcing his award, HA President John Nadas wrote that Mr. Csoman's work "went far beyond the call of duty where you actually embraced every opportunity to support Hungarians in need, and were one of the first to initiate a form of reconnection with Hungary, by organizing trips to Hungary for those of Hungarian descent....Your work has truly fostered unity."

Ms. Molnar was recognized "for her tireless work in preserving Hungarian culture and strengthening the Magyar identity of Hungarian Americans," particularly through her efforts as president of the Hungarian Cultural Center of Northeastern Ohio.

Also honored were Dr. Karoly Jokay, executive director of the Hungarian American Fulbright Commission and a founder of the Jokay Foundation, who received the Árpád Szövetség medal, and Zoltani Csaba, editor of the book *Transylvania Today: Diversity at Risk*, who was awarded the Árpád Academy Gold Medal.

All received their medal during the HA's debutante ball, held Nov. 30 in conjunction with the Congress. The business portion of the Congress featured presentations and exhibits from Hungarians from around the world. It provided experts from various fields an opportunity to exchange ideas on issues of common interest. Although the programs were given primarily in the Hungarian language, the Hungarian Kongresszus also offered English language presentations.



- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing for four (4) years.
- b) For both new and renewal applicants, the students must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2014 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a life benefit member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2014.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
 - d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period.
 - e) New applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of William Penn Life. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.williampennassociation.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. A copy of the student's SAT/ACT scores or waiver letter from the school in which enrolled.
- 5. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3, 4 and 5 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- f) **Renewal applicants** must submit the following:
 - I. A letter requesting a renewal grant.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the questions: "Who do you most admire and why?" Essays exceeding 100 words will NOT be accepted.

The Renewal Letter and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Saturday, May 31, 2014. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2014 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Tuesday, September 30, 2014.

- g) All applications, renewal letters and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed submissions will NOT be accepted.**
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.
- k) All applications, renewal letters and essays must be mailed and postmarked by **Saturday, May 31, 2014**. Any applications, renewal letters and essays postmarked after that date will not be considered.


