PA fraternals honor Nick Kotik

HARRISBURG -- Nickolas M. "Nick" Kotik, retired Vice Chair of the WPA Board of Directors, was honored by the Pennsylvania Fraternal Alliance (PFA) as this year's recipient of its John Jordan Upchurch Award.

Mr. Kotik received the award during the PFA's 105th Annual Meeting held Oct. 23 to 25 in Gettysburg, Pa.

The award is named after the man known as the father of the fraternal benefit system, John Jordan Upchurch. Upchurch founded the nation's first fraternal benefit society, the Ancient Order of United Workmen in Meadville, Pa., in 1868. The award recognizes "distinguished leadership and service to the Pennsylvania Fraternal Alliance and the fraternal benefit system."

Mr. Kotik is the sixth WPA member to be so honored, joining the late Elmer Charles, former longtime National President; the late Albert J. Stelkovics, former longtime National Secretary; E. E. (Al) Vargo, former National President and former Vice

'Tis the season for reviewing

Take time now to ensure your beneficiaries are up-to-date

IT'S HARD FOR ME to believe that Christmas is just around the corner. Where did this year go??

Christmas is a wonderful time of year, filled with joyous holiday gatherings and quality time spent with friends and family.

One of my favorite childhood memories of the Christmas season is of my family hosting an all-day open house each year on Christmas Day. I always looked forward to having friends, family and neighbors from all around stop in throughout the day to visit...and to have some of my mom's famous lasagna and home-made garlic bread! She always made enough to feed an army that day; even with seven kids and all those visitors stopping by, there was always plenty to go around.

The Christmas season is a special time of year for family gatherings and making long-lasting memories, but it's also a great time to review your insurance needs and plans with your family to make sure your intentions are clear and that your beneficiaries are up-to-date.

Here are a few issues concerning beneficiary designations for you to consider, with information reprinted with permission from a recent article in *National Underwriter* magazine:

First, you are entitled to--and should--name more than one beneficiary to your life insurance or annuity certificate. You can name not only one or more *primary* beneficiaries but also one or more *contingent* beneficiaries should something happen to the primary beneficiaries. The primary beneficiary is the first person (or entity) in line to receive the benefits from a policy when an insured dies. To receive those proceeds, the primary beneficiary (or one of the primary beneficiaries if split) must obviously be alive on the date the insured dies. If not, then the insurance company pays what's known as the "contingent" or secondary beneficiary or beneficiaries.

As I mentioned above, you can name more than one individual or combinations of individuals at either the primary or contingent level. For example, in our most common beneficiary scenarios, an insured would name his or her spouse as the primary beneficiary and their children as contingent beneficiaries.

Suppose you wanted to name both your spouse *and* your children as primary beneficiaries. No problem: the proceeds would be typically split equally among the named beneficiaries in that particular case, but that can



also be adjusted to meet your specific request. For example, suppose you wanted your spouse to receive half of the proceeds and have the remaining half split among your children. Again, no problem: just let your agent know that. (provided, of course, your children are not minors. More on that issue later.)

When it comes to designating your beneficiaries, it's critical to be as specific as possible. The beneficiary designation should describe the person with sufficient clarity and certainty so that the insurer can easily identify the proper person or persons and make the proper payment based on your desired intentions. Even where it seems inherently unfair, the insurer is almost always held by the courts to be bound to pay the proceeds to the named beneficiary. There are numerous cases where the proceeds were payable to a spouse long divorced because the insured neglected to designate a new beneficiary following the divorce.

I saw that exact situation happen to a past associate of mine. He was divorced and remarried prior to us working together. I witnessed the shock his second wife felt when he unexpectedly died from a heart attack at age 43. She received an even greater shock when she filed the insurance claim only to be told that she was not the listed beneficiary, and that the proceeds were payable to his ex-wife. You can imagine how that turned out.

The sad part of that story is that this situation is not all

that uncommon today, and sadder still is that my associate was an insurance agent. He spent his career providing excellent customer service and advising his clients to make sure they kept their beneficiaries up-to-date, but unfortunately never took the time to practice what he preached.

So, here are some important points to remember when naming your beneficiary:

1. Be specific with name and relationship. As mentioned above, the name supersedes relationship. Legal precedence dictates that the proceeds will be made payable to the person, regardless if they are still your spouse or fiancée.

2. Where possible, always name your children individually rather than by class, such as "all children equally." If the children are named as a class rather than individually, the insurer may have difficulty verifying who is in that class due to marriages, divorces, adoptions, etc. The term "all my children" may also cause legal problems in cases of illegitimate children, legally adopted children and children from previous marriages. It's important to note here that step-children--and, in some cases, children born out of wedlock--are generally not included in the class known as "my children." If your intention is to have them as a beneficiary, they should be named individually.

3. Per capita or per stirpes? This gets a little technical, but think of it this way: Let's assume you name your three adult children as beneficiaries, and they all have children of their own. Most insureds name their children equally, and the claim is paid "per capita," or by head count. If you named three and three were surviving when you die, the proceeds would be split three ways. If only two were alive, then it would only be split two ways.

But wait. What about the children of the child who

passed away before you? Are they cut out? Not if you designate the beneficiary and use the "per stirpes" provision. The per stirpes (meaning "by the branches") provision protects the claim for the children of any of your beneficiaries that may predecease you.

4. Naming minor children as beneficiary. Few states allow payments of insurance proceeds to a minor, and even fewer companies would agree to do so because minors cannot give a valid release or enter into a contract with the insurer. For this reason, it's always best to name a trustee as beneficiary in most cases involving minor children.

As you can see, there's a little more to naming beneficiaries than you may have originally thought. Fortunately, you can change your beneficiary at any time, and your WPA agent can help you make the right decisions and keep your policy up-to-date for you. Births, deaths, marriages, divorces and adoptions are just a few life events that should trigger you to rethink how your beneficiaries are structured.

Are *your* current beneficiary designations meeting your desires? During this upcoming Christmas season, why not take some time to give serious thought to your plans, discuss them with your loved ones, and give your WPA agent or broker a call. We'd be happy to review your current situation and make any adjustments necessary to help you reach your desired goals.

Tying up loose ends

WITH CHRISTMAS APPROACHING and the year 2017 looming on the horizon, I offer these thoughts:

During a recent trip back home to Ohio, I retrieved a few more boxes of Hungarian items that had been stored away for years in the basement of my parents' home. (See *Tibor's Take* in the February 2016 issue for a complete story and explanation.) I once again came across many items of interest, but three similar items tucked away in a Ziploc plastic bag caught my attention. Closer examination revealed that these items looked somewhat like cassette tapes but were much bigger.

After some research, I learned that they are called "8-track tapes" (see photo opposite page) and were a phenomenon of the 1960s and 1970s. Oddly enough, these tapes, produced by the B&F Record Company in Cleveland, were in good condition. The tapes were

of vocalists Károly Solti and László Szalai backed up instrumentally by the band of Kálmán Oláh or Károly Mágó.

Unfortunately, I do not have an 8-track tape player, so I contacted my father for more information on them. I learned these were actually tapes given to him and my Grandfather Cseh by their cousin Ferenc Keszler of the Detroit area. Faithful readers may remember that my Detroit cousins, the Keszler Brothers, owned a popular Texaco gas station on Fort Street. My father further explained that he had several cars that were equipped to play 8-tracks and fondly recalls playing those tapes on warm, sunny days with the top down on his 1969 Pontiac GTO convertible.


One late night while visiting home, I began perusing through the small library of Hungarian themed books occupying what was once my sister Lizzy's bedroom. I stumbled upon a hardbound book that was only 112 pages long. The spine of the book bore the simple title, "Christmas Carols." It was bound in red and protected by a weathered dust jacket that depicts the Virgin Mary, baby Jesus and several angels. I almost put the book back on the shelf but decided to examine it more

I learned it was published in 1984 in conjunction with the 90th Anniversary of the *Catholic Hungarian Sunday* (*Katolikus Magyarok Vasárnapja*) in Youngstown. This unique publication is a collection of Hungarian Christmas carols from many various denominations that make up the religious fiber of Hungary. Many carols date back to the 1700s. Most of the songs are translated to English and offer notes for playing instrumentally.

The first section of the book is made up of the most familiar Magyar carols and is beautifully illustrated using multi-colored woodcut prints in the style utilized by the monks of the Middle Ages (see photo at left).

Further examination of the title page and bibliography revealed that this book was a collaboration of Ferenc Bitto, Dr. Charles Szabo, Elizabeth Szabo and Nicholas Dengl OFM, along with additional contributions of information added by Msgr. Dezső Török, Julianna Toth, Rev. Andor Leffler, Rev. Francis Karpi and several others. Except for "Silent Night," all the carols are of Hungarian origin.

The book is a masterpiece of artwork and





Magyar Christmas history. I have looked at several booksellers specializing in used printed text and have yet to find a copy. Do any of the loyal readers of *William Penn Life* own a copy of this wonderful book? I would love to know how you obtained it.

We are fortunate to have at our disposal many tools to record history. Whether that history is written, photographed or recorded on tape, vinyl disc, CD or flash drive, it is imperative we maintain a record of our past.

Within my family's record collection of Hungarian music there are almost 100 years of music. Almost all of our recordings were done in a studio setting. But, we are also fortunate to have in our collection video and audio recordings of many Hungarian functions within the Ohio and Pennsylvania area.

Kalman Molnar of Youngstown recorded on videotape hundreds of hours of dances, picnics and other Hungarian gatherings from the 1970s into the early 2000s. As technology improved, Kalman transferred those videotapes to a more reliable and permanent DVD media system.

My family had the honor and privilege of having a dozen or so of those DVDs given to us by Kalman just a few months prior to his passing. Over the last month or so, I have began to play those recordings and find them to be a time capsule of our Hungarian community. I was overwhelmed when I saw my great grandparents Szaiber (nee Silvers) sitting by the bandstand at Shady Run Picnic Grounds as Joe Jeromos and the Tokaji Zenekar played a *csárdás*. I never met my great grandparents, because I was born many years after they departed this earth. Viewing that DVD gave me a sense of connection to them.

I am also honored to know a Hungarian musical historian from Nanty Glo, Pa., named Paul Lasher. Paul has been recording music of Hungarian bands since he was 11 years old. Several times a year, he sends my family CDs of music originally recorded on cassette tape. Just recently, he sent us Christmastime recordings from a 1982 party at the Brownstown American-Hungarian Citizens Club and several St. Nicholas Night parties from the McKeesport Hungarian Social Club.

Other Magyar places and events in the Pittsburgh area where Paul has recorded the sounds of Hungarian happiness and joy include: St. Emeric in Johnstown; the Bethlen Home in Ligonier; the Hungarian picnic at the Transfiguration Roman Catholic Church in McKeesport; the Youngstown Hungarian Heritage Day; the St. Stephen of Hungary Fall Harvest Dance; the Magyar Nap; the Geauga Magyar Club's Grape Harvest Dance, among many others. Utilizing consumer grade recording equipment, Paul has been able to capture the music at a quality level suitable for radio broadcast.

A thank you and tip of the hat go to people such as Kalman Molnar and Paul Lasher for having the foresight to record for the sake of posterity the music performed by the musicians at those beloved events that took place over the previous decades.

When I wrote last month's musing on falvédő, I assumed there would be not be much reader interest in a Hungarian folk art tradition that was popular before the halfway point of the 20th century. Surprisingly, reader response proved me wrong as close to 50 readers sent either letters or emails. Two of them--Elizabeth and Jennifer--included historical backgrounds and photos of their respective falvédő. Köszönöm Szépen!

Hannah Keely Branch 336 Harrisburg, PA

HANNAH KEELY HAS BEEN a grateful recipient of a WPA scholarship grant for the past two academic years. A member of Branch 336, Harrisburg, PA, Hannah is the youngest of four daughters of fellow WPA member Grace and John Keely and the granddaughter of Branch 336 Vice President Zita F.

Hannah graduated from Briar Woods High School in Ashburn, Va., in 2014, where she was an involved student. She was class president, homecoming queen and captain of both her varsity competitive cheerleading and varsity track and field teams, attending the state championships seven times in these two sports and coming away with three state cheerleading championships.

Hannah also studied Chinese for three years and was a member of the National Honor Society and International Thespian Society. She also was an active member of her church.

Her busy and challenging schedule, coupled with her planning for the future, prepared her for what she would encounter at the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Hannah received her nomination to West Point from retired U.S. Rep. Frank Wolf (R-VA, 10th District) in February 2014 and reported for Cadet Basic Training (fondly known as "Beast Barracks") in July 2014.

In August 2014, after six rigorous weeks, she officially became a "plebe" (freshman) in the Class of 2018 on Acceptance Day, following in her father's footsteps (Class of 1982). She became a "Rabble Rouser" (USMA cheerleader) shortly thereafter.

That first year, she learned to walk with cupped hands along the wall, to not speak when outside (unless spoken to by an upper classman), and to "call minutes" (announcing the uniform and time until the next formation) -- all while juggling military training, chemistry, calculus, military history, combatives and cheer practice. For Hannah, the highlight of plebe year was the week of festivities leading up to--and then cheering for--the Army Black Knights at the 115th Army-Navy game.

Yearling (sophomore) year was a bit more relaxed since there were new plebes in the ranks, but Hannah continued to juggle the military, academic and athletic requirements each cadet must endure at this venerable institution while continuing to be a Rabble Rouser.

The highlights of her sophomore year were both the 116th Army-Navy game and learning she was chosen as one of the cadets for a semester abroad. If all goes well, she will spend the second semester of her "Cow" (junior) year in China.

More recently, she spent the first three weeks of this summer at Fort Riley, Kans., as a platoon leader to an aviation unit. She then returned to West Point to be a regimental operations support officer for Camp Buckner (military training for rising sophomores). She enjoyed 10 days leave prior to classes starting back up in August.

As Hannah thoroughly enjoys her Cow year as an upperclassman, she shares one final thought:

Go Army! Beat Navy!







Boldog Karácsonyt 2016

YOU CAN SAY IT IN HUNGARIAN or English, but it is all the same: Merry Christmas!

This month, we will revisit a rather popular theme featured in previous December puzzles in which the clues are the ingredients that make up traditional Magyar holiday dishes. Among the featured food items in past year's puzzles were hurka (a Hungarian sausage), kocsonya (pork jelly) and dobos torte (sponge cake layered with chocolate buttercream and topped with caramel) to name a few.

As in the past, I will list the ingredients to a savory and hearty main dish and a sweet, delicate dessert. Each compliments the other to create a meal of gastronomical excellence. I have prepared each recipe at least once, and, as with most young cooks, I experienced a 50/50 mix of failure and success.

The savory recipe features eight ingredients while the sweet side (a favorite of my relatives in Csót, Hungary) requires 10. A bakery in Pápa, Hungary, makes a simply scrumptuous version which was presented to me by my cousins of the Kiss/Nagy family as a welcoming gesture upon my arrival in 2014.

The recipes featured in this puzzle come from two rather old books. The first is Jolie Gabor's Family Cookbook first published in 1962. She is the mother of the famous Gabor sisters of Hollywood fame. The second source is a 1955 publication from the Chicago Culinary Arts Institute entitled The Hungarian Cookbook. I recently learned that the late, great Hungarian-American chef Louis Szathmary was the driving force behind the creation of this beautifully illustrated 67-page booklet.

Next month, I will reveal the names of the two dishes and the pages on which the recipes for each can be found in their respective books.

During this Christmas season, try making a few Hungarian dishes for your family and friends and patronize our Magyar merchants.
