

### Avoid these 6 estate planning mistakes

TRUSTS HAVE GAINED TRACTION in recent years as one of the best estate planning vehicles in the United States. If you have a trust, you might feel comfortable that it will take care of every estate settlement issue – from helping you and your family avoid probate after your passing, to making the transfer of wealth a very smooth process.

While in many cases that is true, it's not always the case. More and more, we are seeing a trust being used as a will substitute, but using a trust is not always the same as having a comprehen-

sive estate plan.

Here are six common issues that may come up when settling your estate, and some possible ways to avoid them:

Not naming the proper fiduciary It's quite common when choosing a trustee or executor to choose a close family member, often a son or daughter. You value their insight after all, don't you? In reality, that assignment can place a real burden on the person or persons. The fiduciary (or beneficiary) is responsible for transferring all of your assets held in your trust or estate. For someone who has accumulated assets--such as real estate, business interests, stocks or bonds--naming someone who is inexperienced in that position could cause a lot of problems.

Serving as trustee or executor is a major commitment, and choosing one child over another can cause family conflict. As I mentioned in a previous article, I have seen families literally torn apart over a \$500 discrepancy.

Alternatively, if you name multiple children, the stress, potential disagreements and complications of settling the estate could strain their relationships with one another.

Failing to consider the disposition of tangible personal property

Quite often, the little things mean the most to people. Something that you kept in your curio or on your desk for years may not have much value to the average person, but family members may have a special attachment to it. Tangible property is typically handled in a will, even if there is a trust in place. Often, that part of the will is just a clause stating that the property should be divided "as my children agree" versus naming specific bequests. This can (and does) cause conflicts between heirs if two or more beneficiaries want the same item. In worst-case scenarios, this can even involve court and legal intervention, adding even more stress and cost to an already costly, stressful

situation.

Most states allow for a "separate writing" part that can be incorporated into your will which allows you to list certain tangible property items--such as jewelry, china, musical instruments, etc.--and assign them to certain beneficiaries. A key "best practice" is to communicate your wishes about who gets what before your passing to help smooth any potential hurt feelings about the distribution

of these assets once you are gone. Many feel that an even better practice is to gift the items before you pass; that way, you can see the value of the gift being enjoyed by your loved ones while you're still living.

Not accounting for digital assets

When you think of your assets, what comes to mind? For most of us, its real estate, investments, personal property, bank accounts, and the like. But, what about the extensive music collection you purchased through your phone or over the internet, or the airline miles and hotel points you have accumulated over the years? In our area, we have seen court battles over Pittsburgh Steelers or Penguins season tickets and seat licenses!

We live in a digital society. Laws are still evolving around these types of assets, so it's important to talk to your heirs and estate planning team members about any concerns you may have about these types of assets. Many times there are heirs, executors or trustees who have no clue about the existence of these assets unless you brought them up as

part of the process.

Improper titling of assets

This is probably the most common of estate planning mistakes. Thankfully, it is being addressed more often with middle to higher net worth individuals. Different assets--such as 401(k) plans, IRAs and insurance policies--transfer in different ways. As your life changes, and you draft new estate planning documents, it's critical to confirm that assets are titled properly and beneficiary designations are up-to-date. (See Jerry Hauser's articles in the last two issues of *William Penn Life* to verify the importance of having current beneficiary designations). Make sure your beneficiary designations and improper asset titling do not defeat the goals of your overall plan.

Ignoring family discord

One of the hardest things to handle is realizing that some members of your family might not get along

well. While unfortunate, this fact is often overlooked in estate plans. People often set up trusts and wills that will unintentionally feed the flames of family discord. But, even the best planned documents can still cause problems if you don't communicate with your beneficiaries prior to your passing.

Talk to your kids about your plans and why you set things up the way you did. Why are you leaving more to child A than child B? Why did you skip over child C and leave assets directly to the grandchildren? You may have very valid reasons for setting things up the way you did, but if your plans don't meet your heirs' expectations, there can be resentment and even litigation challenging the will or trust.

If you can't bring yourself to have that difficult conversation in person, you can always write a letter that can be left with your will and other important documents.

Failing to update your plan as you age

Estate laws change. You or your children go through divorce or remarriage. A child passes away. Your assets grow and diversify in the years since you drafted your original estate plan. All of these changes--and many others--can have a significant impact on your estate plan. Be specific in your planning. If you've remarried and want your new spouse to be able to live comfortably, but you also want your children left with a significant inheritance, then spell out the terms of what "living comfortably"

means instead of leaving it up to the competing forces to decide.

Having a professional fiduciary or trustee in some of these instances could make sense. Many people just don't understand the resentment and conflict that can build during the estate settlement process. Many times, we hear beneficiaries battling with their siblings, saying "we never thought this could happen to us." With proper planning and good communication, conversations such as these can easily be avoided.

### How deep do your roots go?

NOW THAT I'M OUT OF LAW SCHOOL and no longer hunting or striving for that "dream job," I've finally been able to redevelop some hobbies. Ever since my sophomore year of high school, it seemed my attention had been divided between school, work and extra-curriculars. Now that I'm just working in a job that I love, I realize that I suddenly have more time than anticipated. This has enabled me to pick up old hobbies and discover some new ones. I'd like to think I'm a "Renaissance man," but I haven't

quite reached that distinction, yet.
Anyway, one of my new hobbies is genealogy. For those who don't know what genealogy is, it is the study of one's personal history; or as the academics say, it is the "study and tracing of lines of descent." I call it a new hobby, but I've really been interested in the subject since I was in middle school. Back then, my interest was a minor one, but it has stuck with me.


Of the various hobbies and kindahobbies that I had, genealogy was the one that was put on the back burner for the longest time, and for good reason: genealogy is time consuming. Since I've picked it up in a more serious way eight months ago, I've spent probably a few hundred hours here and there on the project...and I have barely scratched the surface. Genealogy is also expensive; there is only so much you can do for free. You can interview relatives, run queries on a search engine, and visit the local library, but that only takes you so far. To truly see how deep your roots go, it takes time and money.

So far, most of my research has been conducted on *Ancestry.com*, an online database that helps you curate and organize the information you find. There is a lot of information in their databases, which can include not only text but also photos and images of documents.

I get a funny feeling when I see a great-grandparent's ticket for crossing the Atlantic or their immigration documents, knowing that so many years ago, my flesh and blood were filling out those papers, and that all that would eventually lead to me being born. It's interesting to see how fragile the fact of your birth is, how much had to go right in order for you to even be born. If my great-grandfather sailed to Canada instead of the United States when he left Hungary in 1913, then there is a good chance that I would not be writing to you today.

Each ancestor is a strand in a tapestry, and it is fascinating what you find when you begin to pull on the individual threads to see where they go.

For example, my sixth great-grandfather founded



Uniontown, Pa., on July 4, 1776, not knowing the importance that date would have. Uniontown is the home of George C. Marshall and where the Big Mac debuted, so as far as places go, it is a pretty remarkable one to have had an ancestor create. That same ancestor qualifies my brother and me—but not my dad—for membership in the Sons of the American Revolution. My ancestor, a Quaker, did not fight but instead provided milled flour, provisions and other supplies to Colonial forces in the area. Since he was a man of relative importance, his strand in the tapestry is a little longer than most of the others. Quakers kept good records, so I've been able to trace that line of descent all the way back to a small village in Cornwall, England, as far back as the early 1600s.

Another strand from my mom's side terminates in 1856. My third great-grandfather on mom's side married my third great-grandmother in 1856 (who, coincidentally, is the link to the founder of Uniontown). Aside from this marriage license, there is nothing else that I've been able to find about his family or where the man came from. He shows up in historical records after 1856, but there is nothing from before. Part of it might be a matter of bad luck – before 1850, the federal census was based on head of household, so everyone in the family was recorded under the breadwinning male's name. But, this does not explain why this particular ancestor of mine is not recorded in the 1850 census, or why he does not show up in the Civil War draft records. Are these mere coincidences, or is there some other explanation? Was he a draft-dodger? Or a scofflaw? Was he fleeing debt in another state (he was born in Pennsylvania)? Or was he simply one of those nomadic people - the rural poor - who were not tied to one place long enough to be counted by census workers or too impoverished to buy any property. So, that strand terminates, abruptly, leaving me to wonder and speculate.

This brings me to my dad's side. Because we have all made a conscious effort to do so, my family has a clear understanding of where one particular branch of our family originates: Csót, Veszprém County, Hungary. Still, I've been able to trace that line back only to the late 1860s, and much of what I've learned came from immigration records and ship tickets. We have a general idea about what the family looked like as far back as the 1830s, but these are just mere silhouettes on the canvas. We have the outline, but it is too grainy and unclear, especially when compared with the well-documented and clearly defined lives of later generations and of contemporary generations that happened to live in a different land.

This is the branch of my family that I know the most about, at least on my dad's side. Other ancestors on my dad's side are even murkier than that. I know one greatgrandparent was born in Zemplén County, Hungary, in the 1880s, but that is not much to go on. Zemplén, now part of Slovakia, was and is a big area--it would be like saying to my descendants that I was born in Cuyahoga County, Ohio. That's a big place too, and does not give an amateur genealogist like myself much to go on.

Which brings me to the point of my column for this month. I have found it much harder to research my Hungarian and Slovak roots than my English ones. I think there are several reasons for this.

#### Point to Ponder....

I have had a hard time finding personal and family histories of American-Hungarians...until recently. In a future edition of *Tibor's Take*, I will have the honor of telling you about a man who had a dream of coming to America and who wrote a brief memoir portraying his saga and the hardships he, his wife and their children endured on both sides of the Atlantic. This story begins at Kassa, Hungary, in 1914. Do you have in your possession a similar family story, preserved in writing by a loved one from generations ago? If so, I would love to hear from you. First, there is the language barrier. Sometimes, there are multiple languages used. I've found some records pertaining to Hungarian ancestors written in German, the administrative language of the Austro-Hungarian Empire before the dual monarchy in 1867.

Then, there's the relentless tidal wave of history. The United States (especially the North) and the United Kingdom had a better time of it over the course of the 20th century than did Hungary or Slovakia. Both suffered multiple wars, invasions and tyrannical regimes each with its own twisted vision of history. It would not surprise me if many governmental and historical records were destroyed in the dark decades of the past century. I think that this loss has not yet been realized. Years from now, I think that historians will look back on that period and liken it to when the Mongols raided the libraries of Baghdad or when the library of Alexandria was burnt down. There is much that was probably lost for all time.

So, I ask you, my readers, what tips and tricks and advice do you have for me regarding Hungarian genealogy? Did you make any discoveries or find any surprises in your own research? I would be interested to hear your perspectives and your stories. Please write to me at *SilverKing1937@gmail.com*.

## A World A'Fair gives Dayton a taste of many cultures

DAYTON, OH -- The Dayton community is rich with culture as exemplified by the 44 years the Dayton International Festival, Inc. has hosted A World A'Fair, an event where 33 local organizations represent their culture through their customs, dance, music, food and handmade gifts.

This year's festival was held May 19 to 21 at the Dayton Convention Center with the theme "Folk Medicine." Guests were treated to a selection of folk remedies, from herbs and spices to baths and even witchcraft.

The music and dance of various cultures were presented on two stages, including an interactive stage on which visitors could learn and participate in traditional dances. The Tamburitzans, America's premier folk ensemble, performed on Saturday seven times on both stages, doing dances from a variety of Eastern European countries.

Young guests were given a "Children's Passport" which they could get "stamped" at each culture's booth. After receiving stamps and answering a question from each booth, a child could enter a drawing to win a basket of international toys. For adults, there was a "Beer Passport" good for a dozen 2-ounce samples of beer.

The festival also included a naturalization ceremony, welcoming and celebrating Dayton's newest citizens.

Hungary was well represented at the festival with volunteers from WPA Branch 249 and the Magyar Club of Dayton. The Dayton Festival Club dancers performed traditional Hungarian folk dances on both stages. Delicious cabbage rolls and Hungarian sausage sandwiches were served at the booth, as well as a wide variety of Hungarian pastries including palacsinta, linzer and kifli cookies with apricot, *lekvár*, *diós* and poppy seed fillings. The exhibit showcased a typical spa in Hungary.

It is a heartwarming experience to share our beloved culture and customs. Bridging the cultural divide provides a hope and desire to create harmony and peace in this world we live in.

### Church leaders gather in Canada to celebrate 500th anniversary of the Reformation

A celebration marking the 500th anniversary of the Reformation was held at the Mount Carmel Spiritual Centre in Niagara Falls from June 7 to 9.

The purpose of the meeting, in addition to celebrating the long history of the church, was to bring U.S. and Canadian Hungarians closer together to learn more about their faith, appreciate the struggles they have shared and to plan for the future.

At the Centre's new prayer house, which was partly funded by the Hungarian government, panel discussions and prayers were held in Hungarian. The main speakers were Bishop István Szabó of Hungary and Bishop Béla Kató of Transylvania (Erdély).

The program was organized by Rev. Zoltán Vass of the Hungarian Reformed Church of Toronto on behalf of the Hungarian Reformed Churches of North America. Attendees came from around the world, including Australia.

At the end of the service, 50 white doves were released.

Rev. Dr. Csaba Krasznai, Bishop of the Calvin Synod from Walton Hills, Ohio, Rev. Gábor Nitsch of the Bethlen Communities and Rev. Stefan Török of Somerset, N.J., were in attendance and played roles in consecrating the baptismal fountain/Lord's Table (pictured below) that signify the two sacraments in the Reformed faith.

The fountain/table was blessed and presented to the Toronto Church and symbolically placed in front of the outdoor service. Afterwards, the ministers carried the fountain/table into the sanctuary where it remains.

To conclude the festive but somber occasion, the Hungarian Self Culture Society of Welland, Ont., provided a complete Hungarian meal followed with a piano concert in the sanctuary by Tünde-Ilona Krasznai.

Rev. Török's wife Cynthia said the celebration, set among God's handiwork of Niagara Falls, held special significance and helped to make the occasion most memo-

### Longevity training

I HAVE YET TO MEET anyone over the age of 50 who looks forward to a future of dependency, inactivity or the inability to self-feed. While we are mobile, independent and energetic, we give little thought to what our lives may look like as we approach age 80.

Based on the trending changes in health insurance, it is very possible that long term care facilities will become either a thing of the past or unaffordable for many.

We can throw both hands up in the air and say: "Hey! We are all going to die anyway. What does it matter?"

It matters a lot. The way we live now absolutely dictates how we will live in later years. As a fitness and wellness professional, I strongly encourage you to read up on "longevity training." I believe in it so strongly that we now offer longevity training to those living at the Bethlen Communities.

True, genetics plays about 50% of the equation of how you will age, and luck holds about 10%. That means 40% of the outcome is solely up to you. You may think 40% doesn't count for much, but if you lost 40% of your income or retirement benefits, you would agree that 40% weighs heavily.

Longevity training teaches one how to have added life to years based on assessed values of where you are right now. Lie down on the floor with your arms at your side. Then, stand up without using your hands for support. If you can achieve this, you are on the right track to living independently and joyfully for a long time. If this task requires just one hand, you have a little work to do. If you cannot even get on the floor you need to take a deep breath and ask yourself a few questions. Are you flexible? Do you have core strength? What would happen if you were by yourself and fell down? How would you help yourself?

Longevity training leads to autonomous living. There are eight cues in the training assessment: Energy, Physical Resilience, Positive Mood, Self-Confidence, Cognitive Sharpness, Self-Actualization, Self-Expression and Visualization. All of these dimensions are intertwined, interactive and interrelated. Improvement in any one of these areas impacts improvement over all.

Longevity training is serious business, but it's also a bit mellower than you may think. The focus is on movement (rather than joint pounding calisthenics) and imagery to enhance brain activity.

Taking steps to secure future health is a new twist on a savings account. Being healthier longer just may be better than money in the bank.

# JUST 4 KIOZ


One of the winning ideas submitted in our recent **Just 4 Kidz** contest was for us to feature Hungarian children's games and crafts. Hungarian children are like all children – they LOVE games! And one of the best known games in the world is HOPSCOTCH. It's a fun and challenging game that can be played just about anywhere, although it's usually played outdoors. All you need is a flat surface, like a driveway or sidewalk, some chalk to draw the hopscotch course, and something to use as a marker, like a flat stone, coin, button or small bean bag. The following description was provided by **wikiHow**. For videos demonstrating each of the steps below, log onto **www.wikiHow.com/Play-Hopscotch**.

Draw a hopscotch design on the ground. Chalk is the best drawing medium on asphalt, patio stones or concrete. The squares should be large enough to fit one foot and to make sure that a stone thrown into the square will not bounce out too easily. While there are many ways to draw the course, a common schoolyard design is shown here. It is common to designate the "10" section shown here as a "rest" or "stop" area. This is where the player can take a moment to turn around and/or regain their balance. Sometimes a more creative name, like "Heaven" is given to the space.

Throw a flat stone or similar object (small beanbag, shell, button, plastic toy) to land on square one. It has to land inside the square without touching the border or bouncing out. If you don't get it within the lines, you lose your turn and pass the stone to the next person. If you do get it, however, go on to Step 3. If you're playing alone, you can make up any rules you'd like.

Hop through the squares, skipping the one you have your marker on. Each square gets one foot. Which foot you start with is up to you. You can't have more than one foot on the ground at a time, unless there are two number squares right next to each other. In that case, you can put down both feet simultaneously (one in each square). Always keep your feet inside the appropriate square(s); if you step on a line, hop on the wrong square, or step out of the square, you lose your turn.

When you get to the last number, turn around (remaining on one foot) and hop your way back in reverse order. While you're on the square right before the one with your marker, lean down (probably on one foot still!) and pick it up. Then, skip over that square and finish up.



Pass the marker on to the next person. If you completed the course with your marker on square one (and without losing your turn), then throw your marker onto square two on your next turn. Your goal is to complete the course with the marker on each square. The first person to do this wins the game!


### **Variations**

• Change the shape of the hopscotch course. Make it circular, with the numbers going in a spiral direction. Or make it a rectangle, triangle, or firework! It's easiest to start drawing your circular course from the middle and go outward. That way you can make it as big as you need--instead of ending up with your last square being microscopic.

• Vary the size and shape of the squares. Make some of them smaller so that people have to step on their tip toes. You can even make some in the shape of a shoe to control the direction in which the person faces. Get creative!

• Make some squares into islands. That way, a person needs to jump over a distance to get to it. Just make sure the spaces are jump-able! And who said hopscotch didn't

require skill?



• Set a time limit. Make it into a game of "speed hopscotch." Each person has a certain amount of time to complete the course, or else they lose their turn. Or you could turn it into a race!

All her hard work will reap rewards one day. Good luck, Anna!



### Puzzle Contest #145 with Lizzy Cseh-Hadzinsky

### Gábor Miklós Szőke

I recently saw a news report about a sculpture being erected at the main entrance of the Atlanta Falcons' new stadium. The immense laser-cut stainless steel structure has a wingspan of over 70 feet, stands 42 feet tall and weighs over 73,000 pounds. Modern in design, this unique piece portrays a realistic pose of a bird of prey in full flight carrying a football in its talons. The creator is a 32-year-old artist born, raised and educated in Budapest: Gábor Miklós Szőke.

Much of Szőke's art depicts animals; his favorite subject is Dante, his Doberman. After graduating from the Hungarian University of Fine Arts in Budapest in 2010, his career blossomed. First he was commissioned to make several small wooden sculptures around the Magyar capital. As his reputation grew, he was hired to make various animals in areas such as Lake Balaton and Pécs.

The international spotlight focused on this young Magyar when he was chosen to make a 14-foot-tall Puli dog at the Smithsonian Folk Life Festival in 2013. Constructed on-site, the huge black canine was made entirely of wood boards. After the festival, an attempt was made to transport it to the Hungarian embassy in Washington, but due to the immense weight, transport was impossible. A week later, the loveable symbol of the festival was taken apart and recycled.

Szőke's art is modern in technique but traditional in concept. He says that much of his work is connected to his Hungarian heritage. This young man is an advocate of Totemism (a belief in the spiritual significance of animals) and is a proponent of eco-awareness in everything he creates.

Much of Szőke's work is made of wood, but his most noteworthy animal portrayals are made of stainless steel. Several of his sculptures are the biggest rendering of a particular species in the world (e.g. the FTC Soccer Club Eagle in Budapest).

### **Privacy - Personal Financial and Medical Information**

June 30, 2017

#### Dear Member:

Protecting the privacy of your personal, financial and medical information has always been and will continue to be a matter of top priority for us. When used in this notice, the following items have the meaning shown:

- Public Information means information that we believe is lawfully available to the general public from: Federal, State or local government records; widely distributed media; or, disclosures to the general public that are required to be made by Federal, State or local law.
- Non-Public Information means personally identifiable financial and medical information. It also means any list, description or other grouping of individuals, and publicly available information pertaining to them that is derived from any personally identifiable information that is not publicly available.
- Consumer Reporting Agency means an entity which regularly provides reports, including information regarding an individual's: general reputation, character, personal characteristics or mode of living and financial status. The information may be obtained through interviews with the individual or third parties such as the individual's business associates, family members, friends, neighbors, acquaintances or financial sources.

We obtain information about you from the following sources:

- Information that you provide to us in an application or other form;
- Information about your transactions with us (such as premium payments, loans, claims, etc.) or others; and
  - Information that we may receive from a Consumer Reporting Agency.

We do not disclose any personal, Non-Public Information about you to anyone, except as permitted or required by law. We will not disclose personal medical information about you, except as permitted by law or as you may authorize.

We restrict access to your personal, insurance and medical information to those of our employees who need to know that information in order to provide insurance or service to you. We are, and will continue to be, vigilant in the safeguarding of your personal, financial and medical information. We maintain physical, electronic and procedural safeguards to comply with Federal and State regulations regarding the safeguarding of Non-Public Information.

It is our sincere desire to maintain complete, accurate and up-to-date records. You may contact us at the Home Office, to access, as provided by law, information included in your file. We will promptly correct any error in our information. To protect your privacy, you will need to identify yourself by providing us with your name, date of birth and Social Security Number.
