Reverse mortgages and your retirement

AS NATIONAL SALES DIRECTOR for William Penn Association, I'm often asked my opinion about reverse mortgages and if they might be a viable option for our members who are considering retirement or are retired and interested in learning more about their options when it comes to home equity and retirement funding.

At a recent meeting of the Fraternal Societies of Greater Pittsburgh, I had the good fortune to meet with Sallie Dunn, an experienced and well-respected expert in the area of reverse mortgages. After several meetings with Sallie, I asked if she would be so kind as to share some thoughts with our members, and she was more than happy to oblige.

Here is what Sallie had to share with us.

hen people are asked to list their assets for the purpose of determining net worth, many people do not include their housing wealth – equity – as part of their asset listings. However, for many people, the biggest asset they have is the equity in their homes, and this should be a consideration when preparing a retirement strategy.

Reverse mortgages have evolved into a financial tool that should also be considered in retirement plans. It is no longer the loan of last resort or your grandmother's reverse mortgage. Changes implemented by the Federal Housing Administration beginning in 2012 are making many seniors take a second look at home equity conversion mortgages (HECM), another name for reverse mortgages.

Incorporating housing wealth early in retirement may help to preserve a portfolio by reducing monthly expenses and creating another source of cash flow. It needs to be used responsibly as part of an overall retirement income strategy. The proceeds from a reverse mortgage should not be considered a windfall to be spent quickly.

So what exactly is a reverse mortgage? A reverse mortgage is a non-recourse mortgage that converts a portion of one's home equity into tax-free cash. It is available to homeowners age 62 or older. The borrower can choose a line of credit that grows larger over time, receive monthly payments or receive a lump sum. The borrower maintains ownership and can sell the home at any time. In addition, the homeowner continues to pay the real estate taxes and insurance on the property (and any homeowner's dues if applicable).

- **Better cash flow.** For some homeowners, structuring their reverse mortgage to provide a steady income stream of monthly payments helps them to manage their finances more effectively.
- Elimination or reduction of mortgage/home equity payments. The number of homeowners retiring with a sizeable mortgage or home equity line of credit is on the increase. A reverse mortgage will eliminate the mortgage payment and reduce the financial impact on the homeowner's monthly budget.
- Tax-free cash availability. The proceeds from a reverse mortgage are tax-free. The homeowner will not have to pay additional income tax on any withdrawals taken from his/her loan.
- A line of credit for future use. This is one of the most beneficial and overlooked features about reverse mortgages. Truly golden books

(This month's Take is dedicated to nearly one-year-old Laszlo Ganchuk and his proud mom, Judit. It was during a recent conversation with Judit that I recalled another fond memory of my childhood, planting the seed from which this Take sprouted.)

BEFORE I WAS POTTY-TRAINED, the ability to read was already on my list of acquired skills. Books and every sort of reading material could be found in just about every corner of my early childhood home in Euclid, Ohio. My parents and grandparents were always eager to read a picture book to me. As they read, I imagined myself a future fireman, police officer, soldier, train engineer, postal worker, and countless other things. Books were the catalyst that helped me envision both far away places and great adventures that were just around the corner.

As a little boy, I read every book I could about trains, and if the stories were about big steam engines, so much the better. I also liked stories about boats, cars, planes and tractors. (Perhaps this is why I continue to subscribe to many publications about machines.) My early literary friends all had personalities and were lovable characters that I could relate to, and they became my heroes in a wide world of reading.

Little Golden Books were my favorites. I was particularly fond of Scuffy the Tugboat, Tootle and The Little Red Caboose. I recall going to garage sales in the summer with my mom who'd tell me to see if there were any books to my liking, and I often times found Little Golden Books. During my tender years, my family must have owned literally hundreds of these books in varying conditions: some were like new while others had been abused (or perhaps, improved?) by me or my siblings with crayons, pens or pencils. If a book was thrown away due to some extraordinary circumstance, my parents didn't seem to get upset. Most of all, I loved those books for another reason: they were always illustrated in a vast array of vivid colors.

Thanks to Laszlo Ganchuk and his anya Judit, my interest in Little Golden Books has been rekindled. I learned that many of the most beloved Little Golden Books were illustrated by an American-Hungarian artist named Tibor Gergely. In the world of picture books, I think it is the work of the illustrator that often makes a book a popular classic spanning generations.

Tibor Gergely was born in Budapest in 1900. His father died when Gergely was young, leaving his mother with the task of working and raising the family. Gergely always doodled and carried a sketchpad wherever he traveled, leading some of his teachers to think he was destined to become an engineer.

As a teenager, Gergely became a member of the "Sunday Circle" comprised of prominent artists, writers and musicians who gathered at various pastry and coffee houses in the Hungarian capital. Gergely was much younger than the core group, but was accepted because he would regularly draw caricatures of the members and their guests. It was through the Circle that he met a renowned artist and patron of the arts, Anna Lesznai. Lesznai came from an affluent family and supported Gergely in his many artistic endeavors. Although Lesznai was 15 years older than Gergely, the two began a relationship which eventually blossomed into a marriage that lasted until her death in 1966.


The Sunday Circle moved to Vienna in 1921 as the newly-formed post-Trianon government made life for the artists quite unpleasant. While in Vienna, Gergely received his only formal artistic training, which lasted just one semester. Nevertheless, his talents were featured in the work of various magazines, theater groups and puppet designers. After 10 years in Vienna, Lesznai and Gergely returned to Hungary where they split their time between Budapest and her spacious country estate. There, Lesznai introduced Gergely to creating realistic artwork of the countryside which oftentimes featured nearby peasants while they worked, prayed and celebrated life. Like many other Hungarians, the couple emigrated to New York City in 1939 as the threat of Nazi persecution became apparent. They never returned to their homeland.


Upon arrival in America, Gergely was hired as an


Point to Ponder....

So far, I have rediscovered 72 Little Golden Books, of which 15 were illustrated by Tibor Gergely. Two other internationallyacclaimed Hungarian authors and illustrators immigrated to the U.S. around the same time as Gergely: Kate Seredy and Willy Pogany. Most of their original artwork, like Gergely's, was destroyed or archived. The destruction of these types of production art pieces was a common practice in the publishing industry. It was not done out of spite or scorn, but was a practice akin to a mother discarding her child's old baseball cards she finds stored in a shoebox in the attic.

Do you have original artwork created by any of the three artists mentioned above? If so, I would love to hear how you acquired them. - Tibor







illustrator for Simon and Schuster Publishers and became the principal illustrator for the newly formed *Little Golden Books* division. Gergely continued to illustrate the books until his death on Jan. 13, 1978.

Gergely was one of the most prolific artists and illustrators of the mid-20th Century. He provided covers or artwork for *The New Yorker* and *Free World* magazines, won a Caldecott Award in 1954 for illustrating the book *Wheel on the Chimney* and did commercial art and drafting for several well-known advertising firms and publishers along the East Coast.

Although Gergely spent half of his life here in America, he never forgot his Magyar origins. In many of the *Little Golden Books* he illustrated, one can find a yellow house with green shutters, maroon roof and ornate wrought iron fences and decorations. Each quaint house served as a subtle tribute to his many happy experiences growing up in Hungary.

Gergely produced thousands of works, but most were destroyed once production runs of the *Little Golden Books* ended. Some of his work can be found in various museums and galleries, but the bulk of the art that made him a legend was thrown away — victim to the expediency and demands of the publishing world. Luckily, his books are still readily available, so current and future generations of children can enjoy and learn to read from them, just as I did.

On my most recent visit home, my quest was to find more *Little Golden Books*, hoping some were illustrated by Gergely. As with other items from my childhood, dozens of books were placed in plastic containers in the basement by my parents. Many of my *Little Golden Books* were put into containers that also contained different items and toys. I recently discovered some books that were packed in with some Barbies and one or two that were stored with some Hot Wheels. Being that *Little Golden Books* are not thick, they were also easily tucked away with my old baseball gloves and cards. I even found some in a box containing Hungarian Christmas ornaments, with several books partitioning the glass ornaments in a manner similar to an egg carton.

As a young adult, I further appreciate how Gergely sketched objects and animals with human-like facial characteristics, including those in such works as *The Merry Shipwreck*, *The Taxi that Hurried* or *The Jolly Barnyard*. He also could draw animals and objects so lifelike that they appeared ready to jump off of the page and into my lap, as in *Dogs*, *About the Seashore* and *The Book of Planes*. All of Gergely's *Little Golden Books* illustrations contain an incredible amount of detail that oftentimes can be overlooked when reading the story for the first time. A sentimental favorite of mine is *Daddies*.

Tibor Gergely is yet another example of how America benefited from the immigration of many artists, musicians, performers, industrialists and inventors, including those like Gergely who were born and educated in Hungary.

Forefathers of freedom

The Thirteen Martyrs of Arad

Every March, this magazine publishes information about the historical events of March 15, 1848, because the old adage is true: Those who do not learn from the past are doomed to repeat it. We teach our children about the past so they learn from others' mistakes. This year, we will look at the history of the 13 Martyrs of Arad.

March 15, 1848 marked the beginning of the Hungarians rebelling against the ruling Hapsburg family and the Austrian monarchy. Lajos Kossuth and Sándor Petőfi gained fame at this time. For over a year, there were military battles won and lost.

By August 1849, Kossuth accepted his shortcomings as a military leader and placed his hopes, and the hopes of all Hungarians, on General Artúr Görgei (sometimes spelled Görgey). Kossuth gave Görgei power over the armies. Görgei claimed he could not break through the enemy's lines. Some say he double crossed Kossuth because he was never imprisoned by the monarchy after he signed the Hungarian armies back to the Austrians.

With the Austrians back in power over all of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, an example was made of the rebel leaders. So, on Oct. 6, 1849, the empire executed 13 Hungarian generals in Arad, a city now located inside Romania. They are now known collectively as the 13 Martyrs of Arad. These Hungarian generals were: Lajos Aulich, János Damjanich, Arisztid Dessewffy, Ernő Kiss, Károly Knezić, György Lahner, Vilmos Lázár, Károly Leiningen-Westerburg, József Nagysándor, Ernő Poeltenberg, József Schweidel, Ignác Török and Károly Vécsey.

These generals did not start the revolution, but like Kossuth, they were tired of Austria stomping on their rights. How do we remember these brave men who tried to fight the monarchy? Some cities have commemorated these generals and their sacrifices by creating monuments. In Arad, a monument (shown below) featuring an obelisk and wreaths was erected. The obelisk bares the inscription: "Risen on the day of 6 October, 1881, where the 13 gener-



als were executed." In 1974, during the commemoration of the 125th anniversary of their execution, the generals' remains were moved and buried under this monument.

Other cities, like the capital of Hungary, Budapest, named a street "October 6th Street" to remind citizens of the date of the execution. Other streets were named in honor of the generals.

Hungarian composer Franz Liszt wrote a piano work entitled, "Funérailles." This is the seventh piece in Liszt's "Harmonies poétiques et religieuses" (Poetic and Religious Harmonies), a collection of piano pieces written as an elegy about October 1849.

There is a generally held notion that while these generals were being executed, Austrian soldiers drinking beer nearby were clinking their beer mugs together in victory against the Hungarian rebels. Hungarians promised to remember these generals by never clinking beer bottles or beer mugs. It is still often considered to be bad manners in Hungary.

The 13 Martyrs of Arad are one part of the 1848 Hungarian Revolution. This Revolution reminds us, as Americans, how special and unique our American freedoms are and why we need to fight for them. □

DEABORN, MI -- William Penn Association once again demonstrated its commitment to preserving the Hungarian culture in America when nearly its entire Board of Directors and their spouses attended the 59th Fehér Rózsa Bál (White Rose Ball) Feb. 4 in Dearborn, Mich. In addition, many members from nearby Branch 18 Lincoln Park, Mich., attended the black-tie gala.

The event, hosted by the Hungarian Arts Club, was held at the historic Dearborn Inn.

WPA member Ursula Markovits hosted the Benefactor Reception prior to the ball, while her husband and fellow WPA member Tamás Markovits served as the ball's master of ceremonies.

The debutantes -- all of whom are of Hungarian descent -- and their escorts looked elegant as they were introduced. The young ladies took to the dance floor to first waltz with their fathers and then dance with their escorts. The traditional *Palotás* (or Palace Dance), which originated in the 15th century, was graciously

performed in a dignified manner by the debutantes and their escorts. Afterward, all were invited to dance to music provided by the group, Harmonia.

- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "With all of the societal problems we face today, where do you see goodness in the world?" If the essay exeeds 100 words, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Wednesday, May 31, 2017. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

- 3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.
- 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2017 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, September 15, 2017.

- f) Renewal applicants must submit the following:
- I. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.wpalife.org.
- 2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: "If you were applying for an internship at William Penn Association, how would you convince us that you are the right person?" If the essay exeeds 100 words, the student's application will not be accepted.
- 3. A copy of the student's latest scholastic record. All renewal applicants must maintain a cumulative Grade Point Average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale to qualify.
 - 4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2017 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, September 15, 2017.

- g) All applications and essays must be submitted and signed by the student requesting the grant and mailed to the attention of the President. Eligibility rules for renewal grants will be in accordance with the eligibility rules in effect for the initial grant. Materials submitted by anyone other than the student will not be considered. **E-mailed submissions will NOT be accepted.**
- h) Scholarship grants will be awarded by the Executive Committee of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., once each year. Grants will be paid directly to the applicant provided the student is a life benefit member in good standing on the date the check is issued and all of the eligibility requirements stated herein have been met.
- i) If for any reason the recipient does not attend college after receiving the grant, it must be returned to the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc.
- j) In compliance with current privacy laws, all information in regards to the scholarship status will be divulged only to the applicant/student.
- k) All applications and essays must be mailed and postmarked by **Wednesday, May 31, 2017**. Any applications and essays postmarked after that date will not be considered.

Aging Well with Cathy Graham

A good night's sleep

IT HAPPENED THREE TIMES in five days, so I have to write about it. That is how these things work: sometimes inspiration is light and whimsical, other times it hits you like a sock full of quarters.

Apparently there are a bunch of folks on my radar screen that don't engage in full, restful sleep. Their minds are like race cars zooming around the track with no end in sight. Sleep won't come to an active, swirling mind.

A lot of this mind flittering comes from ignoring stress during the daytime when it occurs. Sweeping the day's dirt under the rug can keep you awake and wired.

Staring at a computer, phone or television screen before bed is like staring at a bright light. It prevents the brain from being able to shut down properly. I know, I know: you can fall asleep in front of the television on the couch or in the easy chair. But wake up and take yourself to bed, and--wow!--there you'll be the next day, bright-eyed and bushy-tailed.

Sleep isn't something you can recollect like a memory or answer like a question. Letting go of being awake happens in the bazillion neurons that operate your consciousness. In other words, you can't force sleep; you have to invite it.

First off, breathe. Slow, deep breaths in through the nose and out of the mouth help to slow your racing mind. Think of it as down shifting.

Next, relax your tightly gripped, white knuckled muscles. Start at the head and move systematically towards your toes. Stress can be found in the neck, shoulders,



belly, hips, legs, hands and feet. Release the tight muscles while breathing slowly in and out.

Once your body feels soft, begin to purge the nagging thoughts. Oftentimes, the same thought gets rehashed over and over. Let it go.

Give yourself every comfort to pursue rest. Prepare for slumber an hour before you want to go to sleep. With the rise and fall of your breath, permit yourself to fall into a deep, quality sleep. If the mind starts up again, restart the process. Your brain craves down time, it will comply with practice.

Sleep deprivation has serious health consequences affecting your mood, appetite and your ability to function clearly. Most of us need eight to nine hours of quality sleep to be healthy and alert. Master this process, and sleep will only be a breath away.

These are just a couple of ways to make spring cleaning a bit more fun. And, we bet your parents will really be happy for all your help!







Tibor Gergely: Master Artist

Tibor Gergely was an American-Hungarian artist who was born in Budapest in 1900. He was a frail young boy who loved to doodle and draw. With very little formal training, he mastered his craft to the point where his talents were recruited by several publishers and theatrical groups in Vienna.

He met and later married Anna Lesznai, who was a rich patron of the arts and supported Gergely in his efforts. She herself was an acclaimed artist, and her work today is sought after by collectors. The couple immigrated to the U.S. in 1939 and settled in New York City where they would live the rest of their lives.

Tibor and Anna became friends in Budapest when both were members of a loosely organized group comprised of young prominent artists and musicians called the "Sunday Circle." Each Sunday, the group would meet at one of the many coffee houses in the city to discuss any subject pertinent to the day. Young Tibor would casually sketch many of the attendees and offer them the finished product. One such notable to have his image drawn several times was the composer Jenő Hubay.

After moving to New York, Gergely was recruited by Simon and Schuster Publishing to become a book illustrator for children. Some of his most prominent illustrated books were about trains, tugboats and animals drawn with human-like facial expressions. Tibor also worked and designed covers for various advertisers and magazines and did drafting for architectural firms. His artwork can be found in various renowned galleries and museums. His list of Little Golden Books is quite lengthy, and many editions are still available for purchase.

Gergely passed away in 1978, but his legacy of creating heartwarming characters via picture books will remain for generations to come.
