Swinging easy, hitting hard

As members and friends of WPA are gathering this month for the Association's 35th Annual Golf Tournament, I thought this would be an appropriate time to pay a special tribute to the greatest American-Hungarian golfer of all time, Julius Boros, and his fellow countrymen who have tried to emulate his easy-going style of golf, including Andy Check, Al and Sonny Nagy, Sonny Tollas and dozens more. Good luck to all golfers who will be participating at the WPA event in Canfield, Ohio on July 14.

DURING THE COLDEST AND HARSHTEST segment of this past winter, I decided I would try playing golf once spring came around. I normally dislike golf, but so many men and women play the game--and so much business is conducted while walking between the greens--that I thought it worthwhile to at least know the fundamentals.

I briefed my family on my plan during one of my regular visits. My brother András advised me that, before I invest money in a new set of clubs, I should dig out one of several sets of clubs used by my late Grandfather Cseh, which had been tucked behind cans of motor oil and woodworking tools in our barn. My brother plays the game on occasion, so I let him select which clubs would be appropriate for me. Once I got the clubs back to DC, I washed them up and buffed the shafts using a bit of fine steel wool. Soon, that mish-mash of non-matching sticks looked halfway decent, especially for the price I paid.

Along the golfing paraphernalia, András gave me a few magazines and books on golf...which ended up on my coffee table, collecting dust.

As the days got longer and the temperatures rose, I went to a driving range to try my luck at hitting a golf ball, a task that experience has taught me is harder than it would first appear. I also brought along a book entitled *Swing Easy, Hit Hard* that was given to me months earlier by Andy. While waiting for a stall to open up, I started to read this illustrated book on how to golf. The directions seemed simple, with an emphasis on a relaxed swing similar to the movement of a pendulum on a grandfather clock. As my 30-minute session began, it was safe to say my shots were far from the target, not only in distance but direction.

After a few more self-taught lessons, I noticed a drastic improvement in my ability

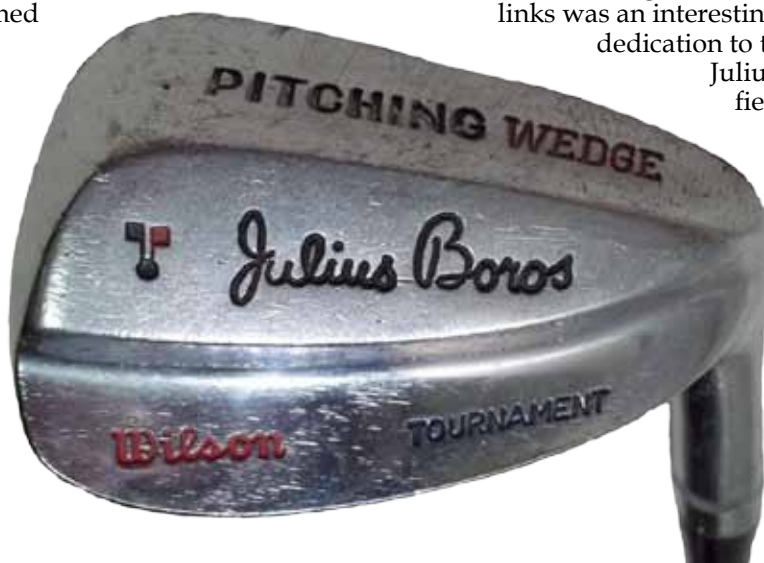
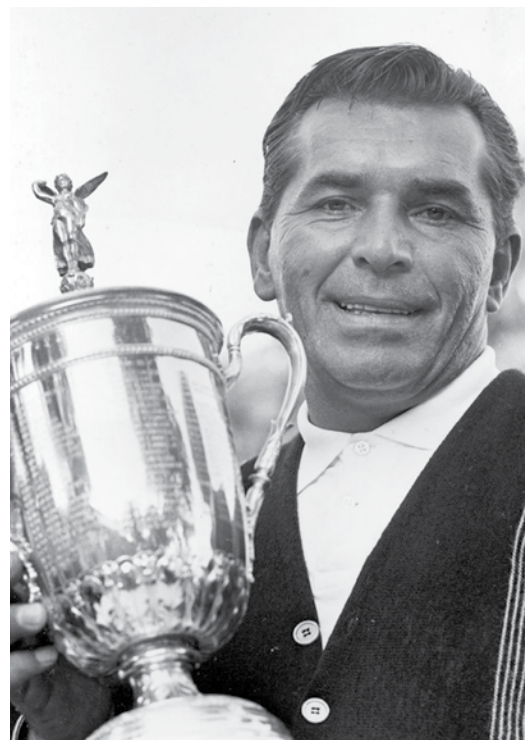
to hit that little, white, dimpled ball. The tattered book was a big help in explaining the basics of golf.

Fast forward to early May. I was invited to accompany some work chums to their private golf club. I was more worried about course protocol than playing the game as this exclusive establishment's membership includes the movers and shakers of the DC area. Needless to say, as this was my first attempt at golfing on a course, my performance was poor, at best. Hitting from a level tee at a driving range and putting on the living room carpet are a far cry from what is encountered when actually golfing.

As I (attempt to) play more golf, my appreciation and respect for the game grows exponentially. My grandfather's copy of *Swing Easy, Hit Hard* soon began to disintegrate, as I would bring it along to read during quiet times when traveling. Eventually, it needed to be replaced, so I ordered a new copy online.

Once I saw the cover of the new copy, I noticed the author's name: Julius Boros. I discovered that Boros was an American-Hungarian, and this quiet superstar of the links was an interesting study in perseverance and dedication to the game of golf.

Julius Boros was born in Fairfield, Conn., on March 3, 1920, to Hungarian parents—not far from where Anton Pruckner and my ancestors lived. In his youth he participated in many sports, but he was best at baseball. His father stressed to Julius that he should get an education, to “work with his brain, and not with his back.”



In high school, young Boros was a cad-die at the famous Greenfield Hill Country Club in Fairfield, where he was permitted to golf during off-peak times and build his love for the game. Upon graduation, Boros enlisted in the Air Force and used the benefits of the G.I. Bill to go to college and earn an accounting degree. Boros eventually earned a reputation as one of the best amateur golfers in New England. His friends and competitors urged the young accountant to turn professional, and at the age of 30, he joined the PGA.

Boros had several nicknames--with "Moose" being the most popular. Other pet names for the burly American-Hungarian included Bear and Big Jules. His demeanor was quiet, calm and dignified. He wasted little time with a practice swing or putts. "By the time you get to your ball," he wrote, "if you don't know what to do with it, try another sport."

He was a golfing pioneer in many respects. He is generally recognized as the innovator of the "loft shot" in which the ball is hit high into the air and rolls very little once it lands. He was recognized as the best sand wedge and bunker golfer of all time.

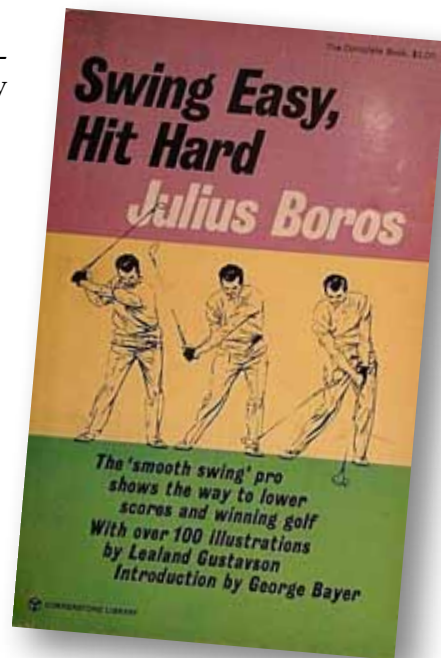
Boros won his first PGA-sanctioned competition in 1952 with a victory at the U.S. Open and repeated that feat 11 years later. In 1968, he won the PGA Championship, making him the oldest player to ever win a major golf tournament at the age of 48, a record that still stands.

Boros compiled an impressive assortment of PGA tour victories, including The World Championship of Golf (1952 and 1955) plus dozens of other first place finishes. He was awarded "Golfer of the Year" honors two times and was featured on the cover of Sports Illustrated in 1963 and 1968. As a founding member of the Senior PGA, Boros was instrumental in establishing credibility for the newly-formed association and continued to compete for several years.

He was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in 1982. When asked when would he retire from golf, he replied: "Retire to what? I'm already a golfer and fisherman. I have nothing to retire to."

A true accounting of Boros' achievements would require more space than I have available. But even this incomplete outline reveals a remarkable life. Throughout his career, Julius Boros rubbed elbows with the rich and famous and was loved for his casual and easygoing approach to competitive golf and life in general. Boros did not reveal until later in life that while serving in the armed forces, medical tests revealed he had a damaged heart. At that time, he realized he must relax his approach to life's ups and downs.

Capitalizing on the post-war popularity of golf, he authored four golfing instruction books. His most successful book was my instruction manual, *Swing Easy, Hit Hard*, which contained over 100 illustrations. Other equally im-



pressive instruction books included: *How to Win at Weekend Golf*, *How To Play Golf with an Effortless Swing* and *How to Play Par Golf*.

In the late 1960s, Akron's Firestone Country Club hosted a pairs tournament that was filmed and later aired the following winter called "The CBS Golf Classic." Even though spectators were admitted free of charge, fewer than 100 attended. One of those who witnessed it was my father. "We were right next to these golf legends," he said. "It was very informal, and the pros would talk to you like a friend." They especially liked to converse with youngsters like my dad, who once got Julius Boros to autograph the 1963 *Sports Illustrated* with Boros on the cover. One time my grandfather and Julius were conversing in Hungarian.

Boros had a large and loving family.

His first wife, Ann, died tragically during childbirth in 1951, leaving the young golf pro a widower and father of an infant boy, Nick. This death left him wrought with grief, but observers at the time still remarked at the way Boros dealt with the loss of his beloved wife, who also shared a passion for golf and was a successful golfer in her own right.

In 1955, he met and married Armen Boyle, a flight attendant from New York, who hailed from a family of professional golfers. Armen and Julius welcomed into the world three boys and three girls. Along with Nick, the Boros children were affectionately known as "The Lucky Seven." Several of the Boros children went on to play golf at college and professionally. Guy Boros competed for several years on the PGA circuit. In 1996, Guy won the Greater Vancouver Open thus making him and his father one of only three father/son combinations to both win a PGA tournament.

On May 28, 1994, at the age of 74, Julius Boros died on the golf course he loved best--The Coral Ridge Country Club--as it was located close to his home in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Moose was found sitting in his golf cart beneath the trees adjacent to Hole #16 by friends who were golfing that morning. He had passed peacefully in his sleep beneath the willows.

The best part of the day was the appearance of Mark Kolozsvary after the game to meet our members at the Café Lounge. He shared his Hungarian heritage with us, autographed hats and balls and posed for pictures.

Mark's grandfather came to the

U.S. after the Hungarian Revolution in 1956. His last name comes from the largest city in Transylvania, Kolozsvár (today called Cluj-Napoca, Romania). The town received its Hungarian name from Prince Kolozs, a member of one of the original tribes before St. Stephen. The word "vár" (meaning "castle") was added to the name and the "y" at the end means one is "from Kolozsvár." It is a common family name in Hungary.

Many of Mark's relatives speak Hungarian, and he is very proud of his heritage. He was most gracious to spend time talking with us.

A huge shout-out and thanks to Branch President and Coordinator Mark Schmidt for organizing this tremendous event. He spent a lot of time communicating with the Dayton Dragons management staff to ensure all the details for the day were in order and arranged Mark Kolozsvary's appearance.

This couldn't have been a more perfect day with the fraternalism shared among friends, the great food, a sunny 83-degree day, meeting Mark Kolozsvary...and a Dragons' victory!

Toledo makes final preparations for Annual Birmingham Ethnic Festival

TOLEDO, OH -- The 44th Annual Birmingham Ethnic Festival will be held along Consaul Street in Toledo, Ohio, on Sunday Aug. 19.

The one-day event will feature popular Hungarian foods, including chicken paprikás, "Hunky Turkey" (roasted bacon sandwich), stuffed cabbage, kolbász (sausage) sandwiches, gulyás, palacsinta (crêpes), cabbage and noodles, pastries and a fantastic array of other ethnic foods. Guests can also view arts and crafts exhibits and cultural displays.

The festival will open with a Recognition Ceremony held at noon on the steps of St. Stephen's Church. There will be a flag raising ceremony, announcement of the recipient of the Birmingham Friend of the Neighborhood Award, and recognition of local and international guests.

Throughout the day, ethnic dance groups will perform on the three stages along Consaul Street: one stage

will be set up at St. Stephen's Church, the second will be located at the Calvin United Church of Christ and the third will be outside the VFW Post 4906 Home.

On the evening before the festival, Saturday, Aug. 18, there will be a "Waiters Race," with the winner receiving the much-coveted Beer Keg Trophy. There will also be a *táncház* (a traditional Hungarian dance party) on Saturday from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m.

The Birmingham Ethnic Festival is an outgrowth of pride and enthusiasm of the Birmingham community, and its desire to share with greater Toledo a taste of the ethnic flavor which has so permeated the neighborhood. 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JUST 4 KIDZ

Slime? Absolutely! After all, the 4th of July is a celebration, and aren't celebrations supposed to be fun? And, what's more fun than slime?

So, this Independence Day, we're going to be making our own **Patriotic Slime**. It's easy and really fun to make.

What You Need

- ¼ teaspoon Borax powder {found in laundry aisle}
- ½ cup Elmer's Clear Washable PVA School Glue
- 1 cup of warm water (divided into ½ cups)
- Food coloring, glitter and/or sequins in patriotic colors (red, white and blue)
- Bowl, spoon, measuring cups

What You Do

- In a bowl, pour ½ cup water, then add Borax powder. Mix thoroughly until powder is dissolved. (If you want a firmer slime, add another ¼ teaspoon of Borax.)
- In another bowl, pour in the glue and mix with the other ½ cup of water. Mix well.
- Pour Borax/water mixture into glue/water mixture and stir it up.
- Stir in any coloring, glitter and sequins. You will see the slime form pretty quickly. It will seem stringy and clumpy, but that's ok. Remove from bowl.
- Spend a few minutes kneading the mixture together. You may have leftover Borax solution.
- Store in a clean container and cover.

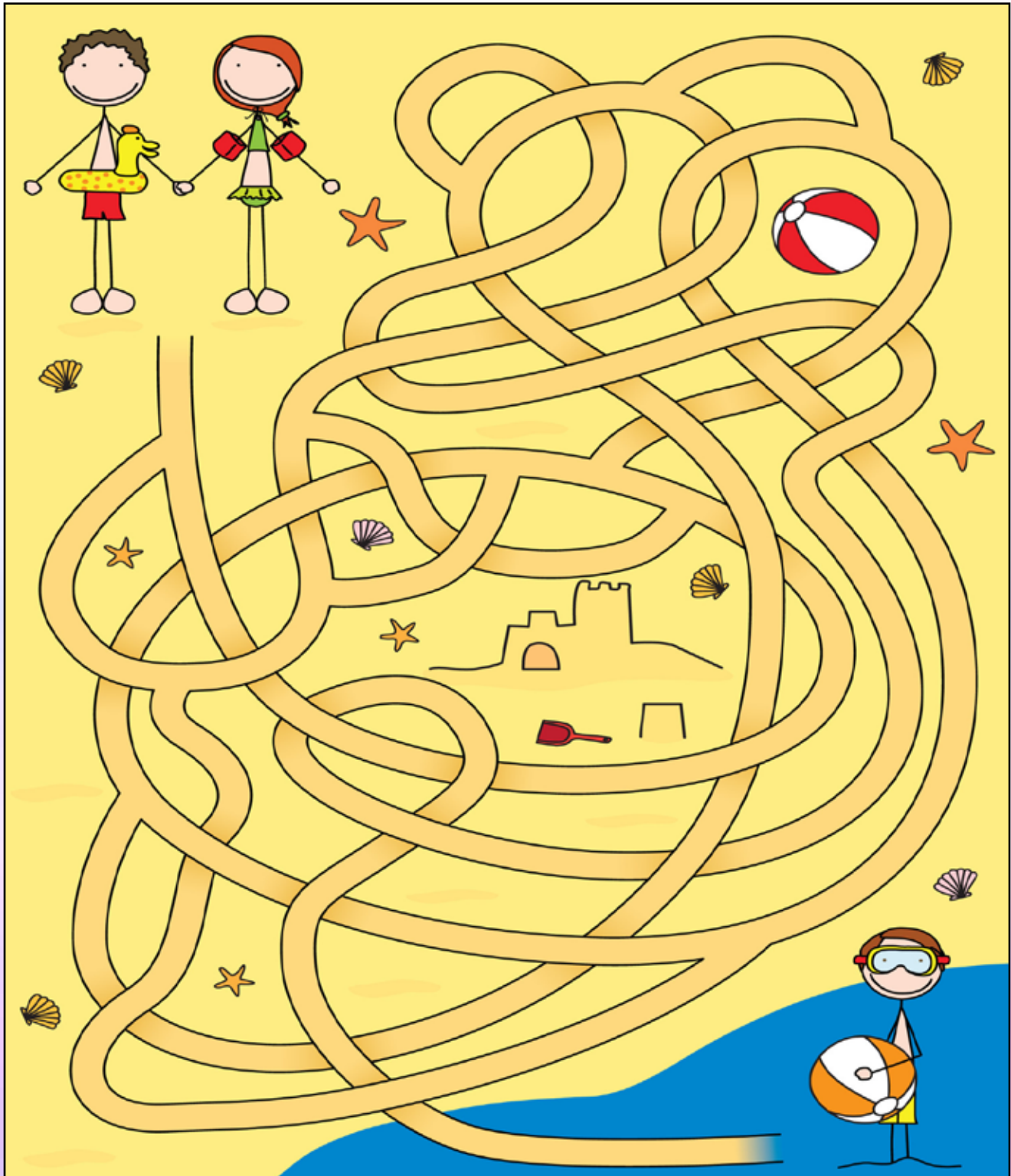

Happy 4th of July to our veterans and our military personnel in the USA and overseas. Thank you for your service. We hope that everyone's summer is off to a great start. For those members with green thumbs, may your gardens be rich in vegetables.

Branch 14 held its Join Hands Day project on Saturday, May 19. This year, our members placed American flags on the graves of veterans in Woodland Cemetery, one of the oldest cemeteries in Cleveland. It was established in 1851, with the first burial taking place in 1853. A total of 87,794 interments have taken place there. We placed flags on the graves of those who died in the Civil War, a Medal of Honor recipient, the U.S. Colored Troops (U.S.C.T.) who fought in the Civil War and the Spanish American War soldiers. The 103rd Regiment Ohio Volunteer Infantry from 1862-1864 have been laid to rest in this cemetery. May all the veterans rest in peace.

Woodland Cemetery was part of the former Hungarian community that settled lower Buckeye Road, and we found many Hungarians whose final resting place is in the cemetery. We also found several graves of gypsy kings and queens. There are many graves of the abolitionists who assisted in the

movement of slaves from the south to freedom in Canada.

While locating the graves of the veterans, we saw many ornate grave markers and mausoleums. Unfortunately, time and the harsh Cleveland weather have worn down the inscriptions of the stones, tree roots have moved grave markers and vandals have done much damage.

Branch 14 member Michelle A. Day is president of the Woodland Cemetery Foundation-Cleveland. She is spearheading efforts to restore the cemetery and the veterans' grave markers, add grave markers to graves without one, maintain the grounds, plant flowers and more.

The cemetery hosts tours and other programs throughout the year.

The branch members participating in our project were surprised by the history of the cemetery, the beauty of the old grave monuments and the interesting group of people who took part in this activity.

I had the pleasure of meeting Bedford H. Forte--"Skeeter," as he is known--is 94 years old and a WWII veteran who helps place flags on the graves of his fellow veterans.

We thank those who fought for our country, preserving the rights that we cherish so much and hold close to our hearts.

Members of Branch 14 traveled and went back in time and to the Arabian Nights, when we attended the Broadway production of Aladdin May 23 at Playhouse Square in Cleveland. The production was Dis-

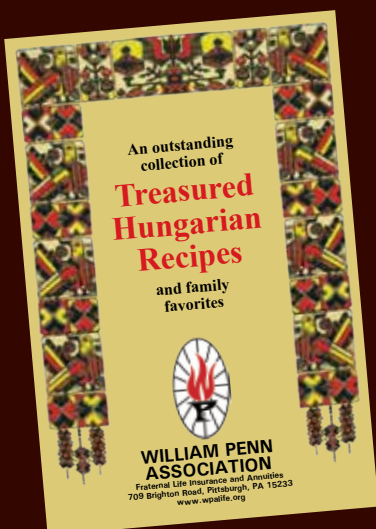

Meat, fish & fowl

Hungary has an abundance of high protein food sources. A variety of meat, fish and fowl are either grown on farms or harvested by hunters or fishermen.

Since Hungary is a landlocked country, many people assume that Hungarians have few recipes featuring fish, but the Danube and Tisza Rivers and adjoining tributaries—along with Lake Balaton—offer chefs and cooks several species of fish for human consumption. There are several fish farms in the Bükk Mountains that grow and nurture trout. Last year, the WPA Tour to Hungary stopped at a trout farm and tour participants had the opportunity to enjoy a meal featuring the delicately flavored fish. Other fish species found in the waters of Hungary are sturgeon, catfish, pike, carp and perch.

Hungary is the world leader in the production of goose liver, and it is in high demand at the finest restaurants. Every Hungarian restaurant offers roast duck and a variety of chicken specialties.

The famous Gray Cattle of the Pusztas is considered one of the best breeds for beef, while the Mangalica (a domestic pig) offers a tasty, well-marbled meat for those looking for a more flavorful type of pork. Recipes for lamb and sheep can be found through research as well.

Sportsmen travel great distances to hunt for quail, Hungarian partridge, pheasant, rabbit, deer and wild boar. If a gourmet would like to make a Hungarian styled dish featuring wild game, there are several cookbooks and websites that offer a wide variety of recipes.

The July wordsearch has 16 clues. Each clue is the name of a fish, fowl or meat that is either grown or found in the wilds of Hungary. There is a puzzle within a puzzle this month as the clues are names of animals in both Hungarian and English. See if you can match them up together.

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Privacy - Personal Financial and Medical Information

June 30, 2018

Dear Member:

Protecting the privacy of your personal, financial and medical information has always been and will continue to be a matter of top priority for us. When used in this notice, the following items have the meaning shown:

- Public Information means information that we believe is lawfully available to the general public from: Federal, State or local government records; widely distributed media; or, disclosures to the general public that are required to be made by Federal, State or local law.
- Non-Public Information means personally identifiable financial and medical information. It also means any list, description or other grouping of individuals, and publicly available information pertaining to them that is derived from any personally identifiable information that is not publicly available.
- Consumer Reporting Agency means an entity which regularly provides reports, including information regarding an individual's: general reputation, character, personal characteristics or mode of living and financial status. The information may be obtained through interviews with the individual or third parties such as the individual's business associates, family members, friends, neighbors, acquaintances or financial sources.

We obtain information about you from the following sources:

- Information that you provide to us in an application or other form;
- Information about your transactions with us (such as premium payments, loans, claims, etc.) or others; and
- Information that we may receive from a Consumer Reporting Agency.

We do not disclose any personal, Non-Public Information about you to anyone, except as permitted or required by law. We will not disclose personal medical information about you, except as permitted by law or as you may authorize.

We restrict access to your personal, insurance and medical information to those of our employees who need to know that information in order to provide insurance or service to you. We are, and will continue to be, vigilant in the safeguarding of your personal, financial and medical information. We maintain physical, electronic and procedural safeguards to comply with Federal and State regulations regarding the safeguarding of Non-Public Information.

It is our sincere desire to maintain complete, accurate and up-to-date records. You may contact us at the Home Office, to access, as provided by law, information included in your file. We will promptly correct any error in our information. To protect your privacy, you will need to identify yourself by providing us with your name, date of birth and Social Security Number.
