DURING THIS SPECIAL YEAR, William Penn Association will celebrate our 133rd Anniversary, our 39th General Convention and the 50th Anniversary of the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc. We approach the year with positivity and cheer.

Unfortunately, many of our neighbors cannot do the same. For many, especially after the holidays, their local food banks' inventories decrease rapidly as donations dry up after the holidays.

To counteract this, WPA is asking our branches all over the country to embrace fraternal service and participate in our annual Join Hands Against Hunger campaign. During this campaign, branches conduct food drives within their branch and donate the items they collect to a local food bank, church food pantry, shelter, or other charitable organization.

The Home Office will assist branches in this effort by reimbursing each participating branch up to \$50.

To be eligible for reimbursement, WPA branches must submit all receipts to the Home Office by April 1, the day the campaign officially ends.

Holiday Baskets program spreads fraternal spirit

PITTSBURGH -- The spirit of fraternalism never shines more brightly than it does during the holiday season. This past year was no exception as WPA branches once again responded with overwhelming generosity to the Association's Holiday Baskets program.

Between Thanksgiving and the end of the year, WPA branches donated 91 baskets of non-perishable food and other items worth a total of \$5,129 to those in need in their local communities.

While we are happy to report that two-thirds of our active branches participated, our goal remains to achieve 100 percent participation.

Half of the participating branches either exceeded the number of baskets eligible for reimbursement or contributed beyond \$50 per basket.

Besides donating to individuals and families in need, many of our branches reached out to church ministries, soup kitchens, community food pantries and other charitable and social services organizations in their communities.

While most branches chose to donate grocery store gift cards, there were a number of branches which chose to shop for grocery items and fill the baskets themselves.

Insure your love

Happy Valentine's Day!

As you know from reading this column, LifeHappens.org (formerly the Life Foundation) and the National Association of Insurance and Financial Advisors (NAIFA) have officially dubbed September as Life Insurance Awareness month. But, when you think about it, life insurance is actually *love* insurance. And, since February is the month of love, NAIFA and Life Happens started the "Insure Your Love" campaign seven years ago. That makes this month a perfect time to reach out to our members about their life insurance needs.

"Do I really need life insurance? And, if so, how much life insurance do I need? Would someone I love suffer financially if I were to die suddenly?" These are common questions that WPA agents hear every day.

Think of your life as a series of stages: youth, young adulthood, parenthood, maturity. Each stage has its own loves, its own rewards and its own reasons to purchase life insurance.

Youth: While it may not be obvious to most people, childhood is an excellent time to purchase life insurance. Health is normally better and costs are lower. What's for brinner?

IN MY HOUSE, we call it “brinner,” a word coined by my daughter when she was very young. Simply stated, brinner is “breakfast for dinner.” On a cold winter evening, breakfast for dinner can be a hearty, healthy way to feed the family. With a few minor adjustments, a typical Sunday morning breakfast can quickly satisfy comfort food cravings while adding tons of nutrition.

Wild blueberry pancakes, for example, are full of anti-oxidants and fiber. Serve them with low-fat cottage cheese or plain Greek yogurt for an additional 20 grams of protein. Use whole wheat flour or a mix of white and whole wheat flour for additional nutritional benefits. I am very fond of Kodiak brand pancake mix because it is already packed with protein and meaningful carbohydrates. Fresh fruit is a tasty topping that can replace the heavy sugar of maple syrup and imitation syrups. At 200 calories per four tablespoons, syrups are true nutritional spoilers. Nuts or nut butters are super delicious on hot cakes or waffles adding a crunch and fuller texture.

Eggs are versatile and can become a full meal when scrambled with mushrooms, tomatoes, spinach, kale and potatoes. The flavors come alive when cooked together. Add peppers--green or spicy--and top with salsa for a Mexican flare.

Grilled banana sandwiches slathered with peanut butter are quick, yummy and stick to the ribs. They make for a perfect meal before or after snow play in the backyard.

My favorite brinner features pumpkin waffles with a little molasses, cinnamon and nutmeg added to a dollop

of plain Greek yogurt.

Brinner is a winning idea for meatless meals, too. It seems to me that cleanup is easier and prep time is almost nothing. Spread the joy tonight by creating your own brinner!

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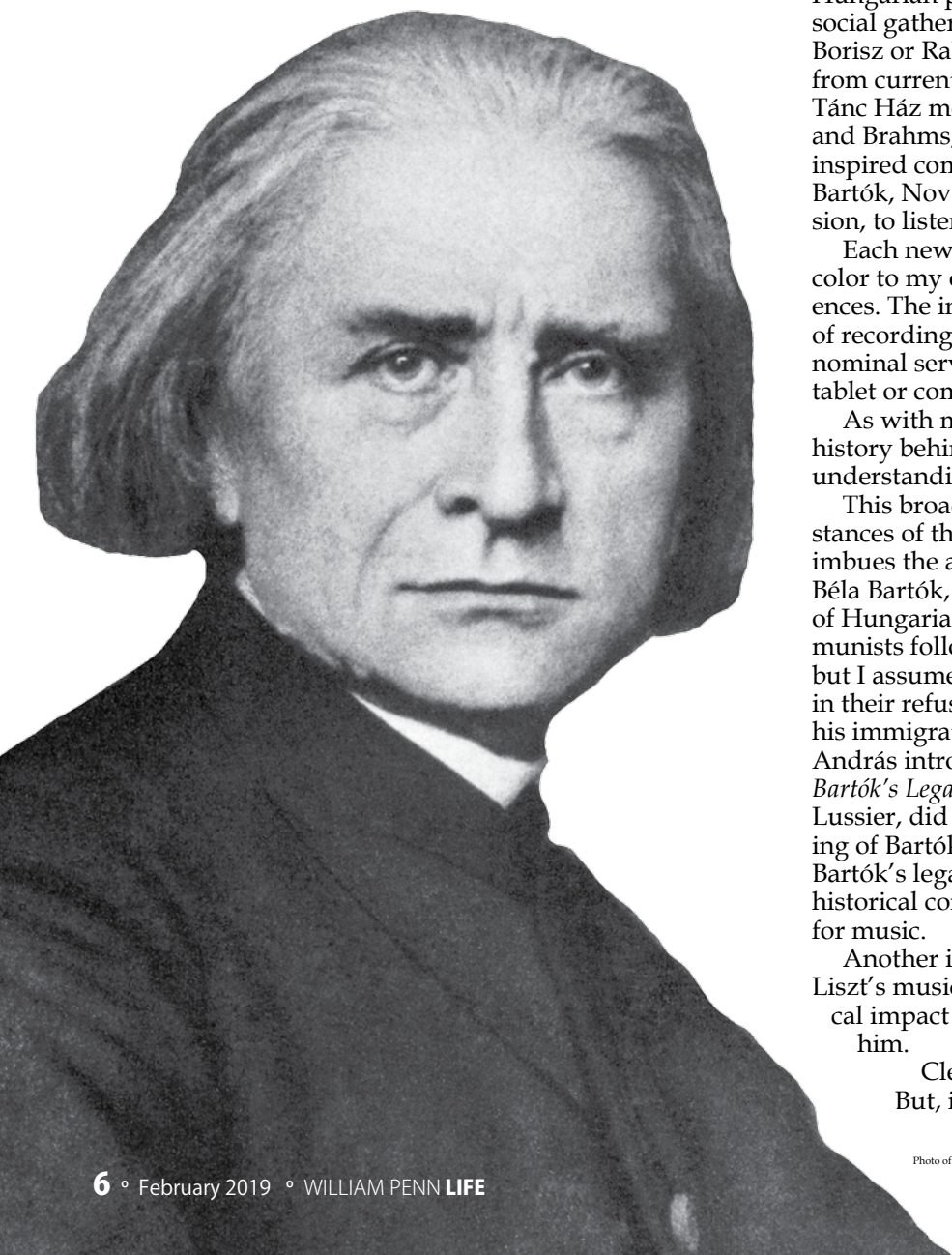
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Franz Liszt & his legacy



AS A YOUNGSTER, I played the alto saxophone in the school band. My attempt at mastering the instrument was less than a successful one. During that same time, I also tried my hands at playing the cimbalom and oftentimes envisioned myself making beautiful music like Alex Udvary or Oskar Okros. As time progressed, I learned that it took a large amount of diligence to make proper music. I also realized that to become a true master of any given instrument, a god-given talent is necessary, and, apparently, God decided to give me other talents.

Thankfully, the muses spoke to my brother, András, who continues to play the cimbalom to this day. Needless to say, I drifted away from performing music to other areas (such as writing) having absorbed nothing more than an appreciation for the musical arts and the composers and performers that make it all possible.

As I have grown older, my appreciation of various types of Hungarian music has diversified. As a kid, I preferred the seminal, easy-listening stylings of regional Hungarian performers who had been a fixture at many social gatherings for decades, performers like Mikisits, Borisz or Rabb. With age, my interests expanded further: from current Hungarian folk music trends (such as the Tánc Ház movement) to the classical compositions of Liszt and Brahms, as well as other Hungarian and Hungarian-inspired composers, such as Enescu, Dinicu, Kodály, Bartók, Nováček, Dvořák and Wagner. I also like, on occasion, to listen to some light opera and musicals.

Each new musical discovery has added more vibrant color to my ever-expanding palate of listening experiences. The internet offers an almost limitless smorgasbord of recordings for listening either free of charge or for a nominal service fee. I can listen from my car, cellphone, tablet or computer when and where I want.

As with most things I research, I take interest in the history behind the subject matter, as I find it essential to understanding the ideas completely.

This broad understanding of the history and circumstances of the time that music was composed or recorded imbues the art with additional meaning. For example, Béla Bartók, the noteworthy composer and researcher of Hungarian peasant songs, was shunned by the Communists following his death in 1945. I was not really sure, but I assumed the Stalinists of Hungary were so relentless in their refusal to recognize Bartók and his works due to his immigration to America. It was not until my brother András introduced me to a book entitled, *Music Divided: Bartók's Legacy in Cold War Culture* by Danielle Fosler-Lussier, did I learn the details to the intentional discrediting of Bartók by the Hungarian Communists. Anyway, Bartók's legacy is an illustration of the importance of how historical context influences the meaning and appreciation for music.

Another illustration of this is the great legacy of Franz Liszt's musical career, which has itself an outsized historical impact on the musicians and societies that came after him.

Clearly, Liszt was an astounding piano virtuoso. But, it is his promotion and friendships that were

forged with other musical greats of his time that molded a framework for producing a long list of musical pedagogues that were instrumental in teaching the majority of performers, conductors and composers of classical music to this very day. Interestingly, many of these great teachers were mostly Hungarian and were graduates of the Liszt Ferenc Academy of Music in Budapest. Besides the music school in Budapest, Liszt opened a smaller version in 1872 in Weimar and is primarily responsible for helping to establish the New German School of Musical Theory. Furthermore, Liszt's relationships with Richard Wagner, Frederic Chopin, Edvard Grieg, Robert Schumann, Hector Berlioz, along with scores of other European greats of music, established Liszt as a regal figure in the world of musical culture. The ripple effects of these friendships can be discovered by the discerning eye and ear in reviewing the historical and literal records.

As I have listened to and read about the people who composed, performed and taught within the realm of classical music, I have learned that many have had a connection to either Liszt or his schools or were tutored/taught by persons who had been students themselves at one of his academies.

At one point, even receiving consideration to be a student of Franz Liszt would have been a compliment and to actually study with him, a dream. In Europe, once studies with Liszt were completed, a student would become an instant minor celebrity in their own right and would be appointed to a prestigious position with an orchestra of high acclaim.

For example, Carl Lachmund spent three years in study with Liszt. He is the only American to have been given a personal letter of accolade and was considered Liszt's favorite student. Lachmund is also the only student of

Liszt's who wrote an entire day-by-day diary of his lessons with the virtuoso. Liszt thought so highly of Lachmund that he gave him several personal items, including several locks of hair, cigars, manuscripts of music and other tokens of esteem. Lachmund returned to his home in New York City and founded both the Lachmund Conservatory of Music and the Women's String Orchestra and led several other orchestras throughout the United States.

The list of Hungarian musical pedagogues inspired by or tutored by Liszt is numerous and includes such greats as József Joachim, Jenő Hubay, Zoltán Kodály, Béla Bartók, Fritz Reiner and (one of my personal favorites) Ede Reményi. For those who do not remember, I wrote about Reményi in a previous *Take*. To recap, Reményi is a remarkable man largely forgotten to history: he knew fluently over 10 languages, performed on all but one continent, participated in the Hungarian Revolution of 1848, was a personal friend to Lajos Kossuth and was exiled to Turkey with him. Reményi even accompanied Kossuth to America in 1851-52 and was one of the first Hungarians to have taught advanced music theory in America.

Like an expanding spider web, the list of Magyars who were connected to Franz Liszt is almost limitless and the list of musical greats who are not of Hungarian extraction is similarly impressive in number and name.

It seems almost every time I delve into the stories behind the classical recordings that I listen to, a name of a Hungarian appears as a soloist, conductor, composer or guest star. Just as in mathematics, physics, cinematography and sports, Hungarians of distinction seem to appear in large numbers, often in the most unexpected of places.

Over the next several months, I will try to delve into several more Hungarians who have made noteworthy contributions to the world of music. With a little bit of research, you can gain an insight to just how extensive the pedagogical legacy of Liszt really is. If you want to learn more, I suggest you start with the names mentioned in this month's *Take*.

Better yet, start listening! Pick up a record or a CD and read the liner notes, or use a musical streaming service like Apple Music, Pandora, or Spotify, as each will curate and provide additional information on the songs as you listen. For example, you could begin with Franz Liszt, then Joachim, followed by Bartók, Kodály and Hubay. After that, pick and choose.

Musical research is a great way to stay warm this winter, so bundle up and put on some great Hungarian tunes!

Special thanks go to fellow Branch 28 member A. J. for rekindling my idea of writing about Liszt and his legacy. An almost endless list of composers, conductors and performers of Hungarian background have benefited from his teaching and inspiration.

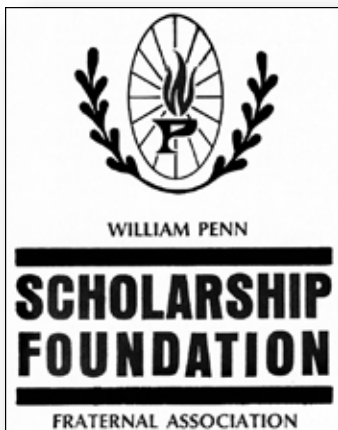

Fraternalism makes the difference when families consider their options for life insurance and annuities. William Penn Association members can take advantage of fraternal benefits like the Orphan's Benefit, Newborn Children Benefit, Graduating High School Seniors Benefit and our scholarship program, offered through the William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc. (WPFASF).

Our scholarship program provides much needed financial assistance to families interested in sending their children to college or nursing school. In 2019, the WPFASF is celebrating its 50th Anniversary--the Golden Anniversary. Back when it was first incorporated in 1969, the WPFASF sought donations from the Association's membership, saying it was committed to "reaching out to talented students and changing their financial despair into the bright promise of a brilliant future." Today, the WPFASF still holds to that ideal.

The first mention of a scholarship program was recorded in the minutes of the 26th General Convention on September 13, 1967, when the delegates directed the Association's Board of Directors to offer scholarship grants. By June 1969, the WPFASF had been incorporated as an entity separate from the Association, with its own By-Laws and a charter approved by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Later that year, the WPFASF was qualified as a tax-exempt organization by the IRS, enabling it to grant scholarships by 1970. Some of the Scholarship Foundation's first donors included Former National President Elmer Charles, former National Director Rev. Andrew P. Jacobs, and the Standard Press and Parker Photo Offset Printing Company of New Brunswick, NJ.

In those early days, there were three categories of scholarship grants: grants based on scholastic achievement, grants based on financial need and grants awarded to students studying insurance marketing. In 1972, the first grants of \$100 or more were awarded to 11 students:

Since then, WPA has been continuously committed to encouraging young people to improve not only themselves but also their communities. Applicants for WPFASF scholarship grants have been asked to submit short essays on various topics. When reading these essays, it is encouraging to see the genuine selflessness of our young members who strive to help others through efforts such as Special Olympics, Catholic Charities, mission trips to Ghana, the Muscular Dystrophy Association's Jerry's Kids program, local church food banks, tornado disaster relief and homeless shelters, just to name a few. You should be proud of our Association's students.

To date, our Scholarship Foundation has awarded 6,308 grants totaling \$2,794,700. For the 2018-2019 school year, the Foundation awarded grants to 156 students, including 52 first-time recipients, totaling \$78,000.

All of this was made possible by the kindness and generosity of our members and friends. Since that very first National Scholarship Dinner Dance held in 1973 during the 30th William Penn Association National Bowling Tournament in Cleveland, Ohio, we have--and will--continue to raise funds for this worthwhile endeavor, which is nothing less than America's future.

Truth be told, our Association's youth are engaged citizens and contributing members to society. Your donations help these young people achieve their academic goals.

Eligibility Rules for Year 2019 Scholarship Grants

The Board of Directors has established the following rules governing eligibility for scholarship recipients:

- a) The student applying for a scholarship grant must be an individual life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing for four (4) years as of January 1, 2019.
- b) For both new and renewal applicants, the student must be the child or grandchild of a life benefit member of William Penn Association in good standing. For the 2019 school year, the parent/grandparent must be a life benefit member for at least four (4) years as of January 1, 2019.
- c) Scholarship grants are awarded to full-time undergraduate students only if they have been accepted by or are currently attending an accredited college, university or school of nursing.
- d) Grants are awarded for a two- or four-year period.

e) **NEW applicants** must submit the following:

1. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. An application also may be obtained by writing to: President, William Penn Fraternal Association Scholarship Foundation, Inc., 709 Brighton Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15233, or may be downloaded from the Association's website at www.wpalife.org.

2. An Essay of 100 words or fewer answering the question: **"What are you doing to improve your world (community, church, school, family)?"** If the essay exceeds 100 words or is on the incorrect topic, the student's application will not be accepted.

The Scholarship Application and Essay must be mailed and postmarked by Friday, May 31, 2019. We recommend the student submit these materials via Certified Mail to ascertain proof of mailing date.

3. A transcript of the student's latest high school scholastic record.

4. Proof of enrollment for the Fall 2019 school term.

Items 3 and 4 must be mailed and postmarked by **Friday, August 30, 2019.**

f) **RENEWAL Applicants** must submit the following:

1. WPFA Scholarship Foundation, Inc., Application for Scholarship Grant, which can be found in this issue of *William Penn Life*. 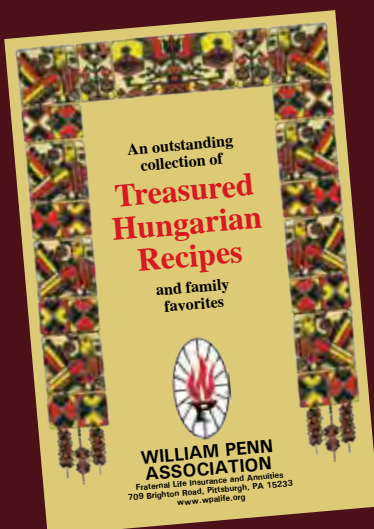

A little more about Franz Liszt

In conjunction with this month's Tibor's Take, the February 2019 Puzzle Contest honors Hungary's greatest musician, Franz Liszt. Born in 1811, the famous piano virtuoso was a very complex individual. Some say creating and performing music was his escape from the realities he faced due to his stardom and questionable lifestyle.

But, many do not know of Liszt's humanitarian efforts. He provided financial aid to many causes, including the construction of the Beethoven Monument, the Hungarian National School of Music, the Cologne Cathedral, the Gymnasium of Dortmund and St. Leopold Church in Pest. He also provided aid to the victims of the Great Hungarian Flood of 1838, the Leipzig Musicians Fund and countless hospitals and schools.

He was a benefactor to many composers of his era. He offered piano lessons free of charge and, in many cases, paid for the room and board of his students.

By opening the Royal Academy of Music at Budapest, Liszt helped numerous Hungarian musicians to become composers, performers and music teachers, with many students evolving into world class musicians in their own right.

For a country so small in numbers, Hungary has had a large impact on the world of classical music, even to this very day. American pianist Andre Watts, for example, credits his Hungarian mother for encouraging him in his adolescence to practice like Liszt did and would tell him stories about Franz's life.

The February 2019 puzzle honors not only Franz Liszt and his music but also his legacy of creating so many Hungarian musicians. There are 16 clues, each the name of a famous musician who was influenced by either direct association with Franz Liszt or by Liszt's example.

Good luck. And congratulations to all my fellow WPA members as our fraternal association celebrates its 133rd anniversary this month.
